Retreat is the Start of Last Battle of War.

(By Wythe Williams.)

I have just ridden a hundred miles straight away through the bit of France restored to her only in the few days by her army. Over devastated fields, pillaged farms, through burned villages, sacked cities, across a desolate land from amid a ruined people, I have returned to Paris to read this bulletin.

complete survey of the 300 square miles of a recovered territory and a glimpse of the new battle front. I am to tell, therefore, for the first time of length, of the most important event of the war since the Battle of the Marne.

What is more important is the picture which I must reveal of human savagery worse than followed the "Scourge of God." I have looked into the blackness of the German soul. All German hate and frightfulness is the flush of her triumph was a minor thing compared to German hate in the dawn of her defeat. Belgium, Serbia, Lille, all their martyred and murdered, can await their turn when Germany sits at the council table of peace.

My picture has a brighter background. As relief against the misery and horrors, I shall show the reason why the German battle line was moved back so quickly, why some thousand of her French slaves are freed. Let me point in the background first, I entered several of the ruined cities of the recovered area at the same moment as the President of the French Republic, several of his cabinet, Gen. Nivelle, commander-in-chief of the army, and many general staff, who were touring it officially for the first time.

Prince Leopold, of Prussia, one of the Kaiser's nephews, who retired from the field owing to heart trouble, has written to General Von Kessel, the Berlin commandant, offering his services and stating that he would be glad, if necessary, to help remove snow from the streets. The offer has been rejected, as the Kaiser objected to a Prussian prince so demeaning himself as to sweep snow in the public thoroughfares.

Profitable Production.

The prices secured this year by farmers is having the effect of acting as an incentive for many to increase the yield in 1917. Experts say that this year at least a bushel to crop is so profitable, acre for acre, as potatoes. A writer in an Ontario grocery paper admits this importance and profit in a potato crop, but suggests a crop that can be greatly overdone. He points out that the potato has only a limited season in which to be marketed and a greatly abnormal production might not catch the year's market as the usual amount of produce of great profit in the possible production of beans.

Where to Place Mirrors.

Place a mirror over the fireplace to reflect the room.
Place one between the windows at the end of a long narrow room to catch the light there.
Place one where it will reflect a charming glimpse of the garden through a window opposite to it.
Place one in the hall opposite to the entrance into the drawing room or living room to give a sense of spaciousness.
Place one on a dark wall where it will catch the light.
Place one in a bedroom where it will reflect the mirror of the dressing table.
Remember that flowers in front of a mirror are twice as attractive as flowers placed against a wall.
Mirrors should be well dusted and the frames lightly wiped with a soft cloth. The best thing to rub up the glass is a pad of old newspaper.

Proper Soil for Potatoes.

The best soil you have on your farm should be given to the potato, because it is more exacting in its demands on the soil than any of the other staple crops and also because the value of the crop per acre is generally greater.
The crop that precedes the potato is also important. A clover, alfalfa, peas or corn—any legume—is a first-rate preparation for a good crop of spuds. Rye or buckwheat plow-d and is good. If you have soil on your farm plant corn first and then potatoes in another.

Another good rotation is tall wheat, in which clover is sown in the spring; second year, clover, plowd under in the fall or early winter; the third year potatoes. However, if you have plenty of land it is best to grow potatoes only one or two years in succession on any ground; thus you avoid diseases.

Mineral Exploitations.

There is a mining boom in Cape Breton these days and it is not confined to the exploitation of one mineral alone, but extends to many, coal, iron, magnesite, silicate, lead, copper and even zinc. The boom covers Inverness, Richmond and Cape Breton counties. In Cape Breton county iron and copper are the minerals sought after. At Grand Mira seventeen miles have been taken out for iron ore. In Richmond, besides copper, lead and allied minerals, iron is being sought for under not only right of way but also in the mountains.
