## "The Quaker Girl"

A MARVELLOUS STAGE SUCCESS

When it is said that the perform-  
ance of the "Quaker Girl" at the Cas-  
ino Theatre last evening was in every  
respect up to the anticipations of the  
audience, no higher praise can be given  
it because the expectations had been  
that the "Quaker Girl" would be  
superlative amongst performances of  
its kind in the city. The production  
is more in the nature of musical com-  
edy than opera and while the histrion-  
ic talent displayed was invariably  
beyond reproach for amateur work,  
the musical part of the program was  
of such high excellence as to com-  
pletely obliterate the possibility of any  
defect in acting marred the general  
effect of the performance.

For the title role Miss Louise Orr  
was a happy selection. It would be  
difficult to imagine the demure and  
graceful girl under the piquant gray  
bonnet as being anything but what  
she represented—the quaker girl  
whose natural or rather inbred timor-  
ousness is being gradually over ruled  
by the desire to see and know the  
things beyond her own quiet and re-  
stricted world. Moreover, Miss Orr's  
dancing was, in itself, a delight sur-  
passing anything to which St. John's  
audiences are accustomed. The per-  
fect grace and rhythm of movement the  
unconscious ease with which the most  
difficult steps were accomplished,  
showed marvellous talent. In a word  
the dancing of the Quaker Girl was  
nothing so much as a perfect inter-  
pretation of the music of the piece.  
It was the absolute embodiment of  
all that is meant to be conveyed in  
the "Quaker Girl."

The comedy was supplied largely  
by the character of Mr. Jeremiah  
Liquor, which was admirably inter-  
preted by Mr. W. Wallace who has  
proven himself time and again inimit-  
able in portraying such roles. Shag-  
ging with him the honors was Miss  
Madeline Kavanagh as Miss Phoebe  
Kavanaugh who at her best last  
evening and the opinion of those who  
saw her so delighted by her clever work  
is that she bids fair to make a name  
for herself as an amateur actress.

These, with Jargo, a Village Crier,  
enacted by Mr. Ern Spry, provide most  
of the comedy. Mrs. C. Hutton as  
Madame Blub, the Parisian costumer  
and special protectress of the Princess,  
brings to the interpretation of that  
difficult role a sense of humor, power  
of mimicry and histrionic talent which  
might well be the envy of not a few  
professionals. All who remembered  
Doctor Howlett's success as Hans
