## A SCANDAL SESSION.

Opposition Members at Ottawa Find Difficulty in Tracing Destination of Public Monies.

Ministers Show a Disposition to Conceal Matters of Special Importance.

SESSION WILL NOT BE SHORTENED THEREBY.

(Special Correspondence of THE GLEANER)

OTTAWA, April 9.—Some complaint is made already that this is becoming a scandal session. One Opposition member who has attempted to get to the bottom of certain suspicious financial transactions has been described by a leading Government organ as a scandal monger. On the Government side there is a display of impatience when enquiries are pressed into transactions that seem to require clearing up. Something resembling a conspiracy of concealment seems to exist among Ministers and their supporters. Never was there a session when it was more difficult to ascertain the facts in regard to contracts and other business involving patronage and affording opportunities for corrupt transactions. Never was there a year in which more money was paid or more contracts by the Government with persons and companies whose identity, locality and history cannot be ascertained.

**Saskatchewan Valley Land Co.**  
What is the reason that the names of the persons comprising the Saskatchewan Valley Land Company cannot be learned? It has been discovered with some difficulty that at least one member of Parliament has been profiting by this transaction, and there is another who gave no answer at all when asked if he had not made money out of it. How many other members and former members, how many Ministers and ex-Ministers have been made richer by the profits of 700 per cent obtained on this \$250,000 investment, cannot be learned.

**The North Atlantic Trading Co.**  
How is it that the North Atlantic Trading Company, which is receiving \$75,000 to \$100,000 a year in business on Continental immigration, most of whom would probably come to this country without the effort of any agency, and many of whom could very well be spared, is involved in so much mystery? The Government states that the Company has its headquarters in Amsterdam, but all enquiry at Amsterdam results in the reply that no such corporation is known there. How is it that when the Committee on Colonization asks the superintendent of immigration who compose the Company he is not able to give the name of a responsible man in it? What is the reason that after he has undertaken to wire to Europe for information, if the Minister has no objection, he has to come back with the report to the Committee that the Minister forbade the cable to be sent. And again what is the meaning of Mr. Oliver's conduct when after instructing his deputy to tell the superintendent not to send the message he goes into the House and announces the charge of forbidding the enquiry by saying that he never spoke to the superintendent about it? One would think it should not be necessary to employ a detective to find out whether a Minister has issued an order directly or indirectly to his superintendent. Yet that seems to be necessary in order to know whether the Minister's denial in the House has any value as a means of information.

### To Trace the Destination of Public Money.

There is reason to believe that the session now well under way will be a scandal session if that is the name to apply to one in which serious and determined effort will be made to trace the destination of public money. The country is now spending about \$100,000,000 a year or \$70 or \$80 for every family in it, and a Parliament representing those families has a duty to perform in demanding a full accounting of this expenditure. The Militia Department is laying in what it calls reserve stores not only of ammunition but of clothing, saddlery and other equipment by hundreds of thousands of dollars worth, and most of it is bought without tender. The Marine and Fisheries Department has almost abolished the tender system in procuring equipment for light houses and other projections to navigation. In the Railway Department most of the supplies are bought from friends of the Government without competition, and it is difficult to ascertain in many cases who the sellers are. Supply companies are organized for the purpose of buying goods at regular prices and selling to the Government at a profit. One of these went to Newfoundland to be incorporated and the house has not yet been able to learn the names of the directors.

### The Yukon Balance Sheet.

A considerable part of two days has been expended in the endeavor to get the particulars of the contract made by the Yukon Council with one Mr. Hatfield, who has undertaken to produce rain in that district for \$10,000, his expenses to be paid when he makes rain or not. Last week Mr. Oliver when asking for the Yukon appropriation informed the House that Ottawa had full jurisdiction over the Yukon Government, whose head was an officer of the Federal administration. Last week the same Minister refused to explain or to acquire information about the rain making contract, maintaining that it was purely local matter, with which the Government and Parliament had no business to interfere. At the same time the Chief Commissioner of the Yukon was said to be in Ottawa in daily communication with the Minister who never, however, refused to know anything about the expenditure in the Yukon of the money taxed out of the people of Canada. The same Minister refused to know or to find out even the names

of the members of the trading company to whom he has already paid \$500,000 for Galician and other immigrants. Not only does he refuse to find out but he prevents his own officers from carrying out their own promise to cable for information.

### Session Will Not Be Without Fruit.

If this is to be a scandal session or a session of enquiry, it will not be the first. The people of Canada have not forgotten the investigation made in other days when Sir John Thompson as Premier of Canada gave all possible assistance to the enquiry and subsequent prosecution of members of his own party. One Opposition member, recalling those days, observed that if the same course were followed now the jail population would be increased and some seats vacated on the Government side of the House. It does not appear likely that the Ministers now controlling Parliament will take the risk of proving Mr. Bennett's conclusion incorrect. His observations were made in connection with the remarkable collapse of the so called Laurier tower on the new addition to the Parliament Building. The wreck of this structure speaks for itself, exhibiting a thin outer course of stone with an inner course of brick, and all the intervening space filled with a miscellaneous heap of pebbles, sand, cinders and other convenient material having nothing to bind it together. The tower as it lies is itself a scandal known and read of by all men.

### It Offers a Ghastly Contrast

to the Langevin block near by, of which something was heard of last year and in the way of criticism. But the Langevin block stands today a magnificent example of competent workmanship. Its solid masonry, which will probably be an illustration of shame and disgrace, it is now, reflects credit upon the administration by which it was constructed. The Laurier tower, which did not stand until it was completed, is an illustration of the same thing. It is a small affair taken by itself but important when it is considered that the same department and the same officer are responsible for the expenditures of many millions of dollars every year in structures all over the country.

### A Government Disgrace.

A good deal was heard in Friday's discussion about local works, some of which have had a history not less disastrous and scandalous than that of the building which has been called the Laurier Tower. It is not pleasant to find the rural members saying that a building erected in the capital of Canada, "the Washington of the North," under the very eyes of the head of the Public Works Department, is of a class of workmanship which would not be accepted by a farmer for a cow-house or a hog-pen, but anyone who looks at the wreck will have no hesitation in accepting that statement.
