ELWOOD KITCHEN CHARGED WITH THEFT FROM THE D. S. C. R.

Has Been Employed as Fireman for Some Time at the Local Hospital

SOME OF THE STOLEN BEDDING WAS RETURNED

Re-checking of the Storeroom Indicates Bedstead Was Not Taken

Elwood Kitchen, who has been employed as a fireman at the D. S. C. R. Hospital, was arrested by Patrolman Alex. Murray yesterday afternoon on a warrant charging him with the theft of bedding valued at approximately \$250 from the hospital storeroom last Saturday night.

Kitchen appeared in the Police Court this morning, and upon the request of Charles L. Dougherty, who appeared for the defendant, the case was adjourned until tomorrow. Capt. J. S. Gale appeared for Lieut. Col. S. S. Wetmore, assistant director of the New Brunswick D. S. C. R. unit, who is the complainant in the case.

From D. S. C. R. officials it was learned that since the robbery occurred a considerable amount of the stolen material had been returned in a mysterious manner, being found on the main steps of the institution, where it had been left by some person. The D. S. C. R. officials, it is said, expect to be able to prove that Kitchen was the person who returned the stolen goods, but further than that there was said to be no definite information as yet.

It was also stated this morning that a rechecking of the stock in the storeroom at the hospital made it appear unlikely that an entire metal bedstead had been taken with the bedding, as originally reported to the police.

Fredericton Junction Man Accidentally Shot Himself

J. C. Atkinson, of Fredericton Junction, is at the Victoria Hospital as the result of injuries received when a rifle which he was handling went off and the bullet entered his arm. Dr. G. C. VanWart, the attending physician, has had an X-ray taken of the wound to ascertain the extent of the injury.

BOURKE AND O'REE SENT UP FOR TRIAL

Will Face Charge of Wounding With Intent to Kill at January Court

On the charge of wounding Arthur H. Esley with intent to kill on the night of October 19th Teddy Bourke and Charles O'Ree were both sent up for trial this morning by Police Magistrate Limerick at the conclusion of their preliminary examination.

When the case was adjourned from Tuesday it was stated that O'Ree would call witnesses today in an effort to prove an alibi, but when court opened today he said he would not call witnesses at present, and the defence will therefore not be presented until the case comes before the King's Bench Court for York in January.

The prisoners were remanded to jail and no application in respect to the granting of bail was made.

MADE GOOD SHOWING

Cadet Corps of Provincial Normal School Made Good Showing When Examined by Lt. Col. Snow

Lieut. Col. A. B. Snow, Inspector of the New Brunswick Cadet Corps and Examiner in Physical training for the province, has been in the city inspecting the students of the Provincial Normal School in physical training.

Col. Snow stated this morning that he was very well satisfied with the results of Sergeant A. W. Oliver's instruction and stated that up to date 65 students had been examined and that of these eighty per cent. had passed their examinations well. Col. Snow expects to complete his work this afternoon or tomorrow morning and stated that he was returning to this city in a month's time when he would examine 65 more students in physical training.

Arthur L. Noble Shot Last Night at Penniac---Sheriff Arrested H. L. Stevenson

Mrs. Stevenson Says Four Shots Were Fired From Behind a Barn While She and Her Sister, Miss Annie Brewer, With Mr. Noble, Were Walking Up a Road From the Highway to the Residence of Richard Donald—Mr. Noble Brought to Victoria Hospital and Will Recover Unless Complications Set In—Conference This Afternoon to Determine Charge Against Stevenson.

Arthur L. Noble, a well known local lumberman, was shot through the back by one of four shots which were fired at him from behind a barn while he walked along a road leading from the highway to the residence of Richard Donald at Penniac, 9 miles from Fredericton, between 8:30 and 9 o'clock last night.

The bullet passed through his left lung and he is now at Victoria Hospital in a critical condition but with Dr. C. P. Holden, his family physician, expecting his recovery unless complications set in. He was brought to the hospital from Penniac after midnight and early this afternoon Dr. Holden stated that he was resting comfortably.

Sheriff Makes Arrest.

This morning Herbert L. Stevenson, who resides at 412 Aryle street, Fredericton, was arrested by Sheriff Hawthorne at Penniac upon information given to the Sheriff by his wife, who said that she and her sister were walking with Mr. Noble at the time and declared the shooting was the result of her husband's jealousy.

Stevenson was brought here by Sheriff Hawthorne immediately after his arrest and lodged in a cell at the Police Station until Judge Limerick, Sheriff Hawthorne, Dr. Holden and others held a conference, which was timed for 2:30 o'clock this afternoon at the Police Magistrate's office when the character of the charge to be laid against Stevenson will be discussed after which he will be arraigned and remanded pending further developments.

Stevenson Denies His Guilt.

Sheriff Hawthorne said that Stevenson entered no objections to being placed under arrest but declared that he did not do any shooting and it is understood that no firearms were found upon him, although a revolver is said to have been used to do the shooting. Stevenson is a returned soldier, having gone overseas with the 104th Battalion. He won the Military Medal through meritorious service performed in France and shortly before his return from overseas the decoration was presented to his wife at a formal function which took place at the office of the Lieutenant Governor in this city, Hon. William Pugsley making the presentation.

Mr. Noble is a prominent lumber operator, is married and resides with

his family on George street. He carries on extensive lumber operations on the Upper St. John river and is an enthusiastic motorist.

Mrs. Stevenson's Story.

When Sheriff Hawthorne reached Penniac this morning he found Stevenson at the residence of W. Harry Allen, the well known guide, and also found an unwillingness by about everybody he came in contact with there to discuss the case. The Sheriff was accompanied by Sgt. Nathaniel Jones and City Marshal William Hughes and they then went to the Donald home, a short distance away. There they found Mrs. Stevenson and her sister, who had been spending several weeks at Mr. Donald's, who they addressed as "Uncle."

Mrs. Stevenson showed no unwillingness to talk and told Sheriff Hawthorne the story upon the strength of which he later arrested her husband. She said that Mr. Noble had driven up to Penniac in his high powered automobile, which was still parked near the highway, and that he was walking up the road with her and her sister when suddenly four shots were fired from behind a barn in the field alongside the road, one of the shots taking effect in Mr. Noble's back. The shots, she said, were fired by her husband, who had been jealous and had

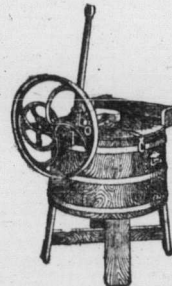
