Berlin, March 21.—The press representatives whose duties are to attend the Reichstag have ceased entirely to report the meetings of the body, owing to the incident yesterday during the debate on the colonial budget, when Herr Groeber, the Centre leader, called the journalists "swine" because they jeered at a statement used by a member to the effect that negroes also had immortal souls.

Over one hundred newspaper men debated the matter in the Reichstag building this morning, and decided that no further reports would be sent out unless an apology was forthcoming. The newspaper proprietors and the news agencies all support the reporters. It was suggested by various of the newspaper men that one of their number be selected to challenge Herr Groeber to a duel.
