Society accords her unanimously this privilege, and though she may not herself always individually deserve it, her sex collectively is considered to be entitled to it.

AN ANCIENT PAPER MILL .- The old paper mill says the West Chester Regisfer, in which the paper was manufactured used by Benjamin Franklin in his' printing office, is still in operation on Chester Creek, Delaware county, and owned by Mr. Wilcox, the son of the gentleman who held it during the lifetime of Franklin. The paper was made at that time and isstill manufactured by hand. Scarcely any change has been made in the mill, and the same process of making rags into paper is in operation to day as was followed some odd hundred and forty years ago; the mill having been erected year 1713. Mills, alluded to above, have long been exclusively devoted to the manufacture of bank note and map paper, of course by hand. The paper for the notes of the old United States Bank, of which much was said at the time, was made at this establishment.
