

ORDAINED TO THE ANGLICAN PRIESTHOOD

The first ordination to the Anglican priesthood ever held in the Episcopal parish of Hampton, was held on Sunday morning, Sept. 22nd in the chapel of the Messiah, Hampton Station. The candidate was the Rev. A. Fenwick, of Upham, and the celebrant was the Rev. Dr. Richardson, lord bishop of Fredericton, who was assisted by Rev. A. J. Crowfoot, rector at Hampton, Rev. Mr. Leroy, rector of St. Martins, Rev. Dr. J. R. Campbell and Rev. Milledge Walker.

The service occupied about two hours and was of an intensely interesting character, every part being suffused with religious fervor and marked with a high degree of spiritual power. The sermon which led the service, apart from prayer and the singing of a hymn, was preached by Bishop Richardson, who founded it on the rubric provided for the ordination of a priest. It was a luminous presentation of the character and office of those seeking to enter the ministry. A candidate must be "called," sent or authorized. He must be a messenger with a message from the oracles of God and so on through the various characteristics of a good and faithful servant of the grace of God.

There was also a pointed charge to the laity to revere the messenger and heed his message. The full morning service of the church was carried out with the communion service, including the Tricene Creed, during which the candidate was examined, received and duly ordained to his office by the laying of hands and the prescribed prayers. Not less than eight hymns were sung in addition to musical responses to the commandments and the litany, as well as the chanting of psalms. In all of these a strong choir was ably sustained by the immense congregation which remained to the end of the service, many members of other churches being among them. About sixty persons communicated at the Lord's table and taken throughout it was a season refreshing to all present so that it will be an occasion long to be cherished in the thoughts and hearts of the people.

WILL HAVE MODERN MARINE DEPOT

Work Progressing Rapidly on the New Wharf and Depot at St. John.

Work is rapidly going forward on the new marine wharf and depot being constructed under the orders of Hon. J. D. Hazen on the West Side, St. John. Hon. Mr. Hazen, in company with Basil Fraser, marine and fisheries engineer, visited the work on an inspection trip. The minister expressed himself as greatly pleased with the progress being made. The work to date has been entirely satisfactory, and the instructions of Mr. Hazen will result in the construction of a most modern marine depot, adequate for the needs of the marine department for years to come.

The wharf, which is of concrete, will be the first concrete wharf in the harbor, and will be entirely up to date. All other features of the depot will be carried out on the same broad idea of providing nothing but the best.

When the work is completed there will be a marine depot there second to none in existence, another evidence of the rapidly growing importance of the port of St. John, and the determination of the government to see that the interest of the public services are not neglected.

FORCED OUT OF BUSINESS

Toronto, Sept. 13.—Because of unhappy experiences during the last three years, The Sovereign Fire Assurance Company of Canada, with headquarters in the Temple Building, Toronto, has been forced out of business.

The Canadian business of the Company has been taken over by the Phoenix Fire Insurance Company of Hartford, Conn., while the policies sold by the Company in the United States are being taken care of by a New York Company.

The Sovereign Fire Assurance Company had an authorized capital of \$2,000,000, and a paid-up capital of over half a million.

Until three years ago the Company was doing business exclusively in Canada. Then it was decided to try the United States field, and agencies were established in various parts of the country. The company suffered some heavy losses in New York and had been losing money for some time. One misfortune came after another and the Company was eventually compelled to re-insure its United States business.

CANADIAN WILL REPRESENT CANADA

Dr. William Wakeham, of Gaspé, commanding officer of the Fisheries patrol boat "Princess," and inspector of fisheries for districts embracing treaty waters has been nominated by the Canadian Government, under the terms of an agreement of July 20, 1912, between Great Britain and the United States regarding Regulation and Bays, following the decision of The Hague tribunal of Sept. 7, 1910, as their representative on a commission to be known as the Permanent Mixed Fishery Commission.

This commission is appointed for four years and will only sit when there is any disagreement between the United States and Canada as to the reasonableness of any regulation made concerning fisheries in treaty waters by either country. The members of the commission now are Dr. P. P. Hoek, of the International Fisheries Congress, Holland, acting as chairman; Dr. Hugh Smith, representing the United States, and Dr. Wakeham, representing Canada. None of the members of the commission will receive a salary.

Section four of article one of the agreement of July 20, 1912, between Great Britain and the United States provides that permanent Mixed Fishery Commission for Canada and Newfoundland shall be established for the decision of such questions as to the reasonableness of future regulations as contemplated by article four of the special agreement of January 27, 1909.

According to the terms the commission was to consist of an expert "national" appointed by each party for five years and the third member was not to be a national of either party. Failing an agreement to decide upon a chairman by the two representatives, he was to be nominated by the Queen of the Netherlands.

As the parties representing Canada and the United States could not decide upon a chairman, Dr. Hoek was appointed by the Queen of the Netherlands. Dr. Wakeham, the Canadian representative, has been in the department for thirty years and thoroughly understands the fisheries situation more especially as regards treaty waters.

GIRL LOOKING FOR RELATIVES

If anyone knows of relatives of Maude Howe, formerly of St. John, and now of Ottawa, a great favor will be conferred upon her by communicating the information to Rev. J. J. Walsh of Halifax Trinity Church, for she is anxious to obtain news of her people after twenty eight years absence from the city.

In 1885 Maude Howe was five years old and lived in St. John or vicinity. In that year a girl named Hickey was leaving St. John to attend a convent in Ottawa and the little Howe girl was confided to her care and was placed by her in the Catholic orphanage. Soon afterwards she was adopted by a Catholic family living not far from Ottawa, with them she has since remained, but has never heard of her own people. Naturally anxious for news of them, she has set on foot enquiries as to their whereabouts if they are living.

BRITISH EXHIBITION FOR DOMINION

Favors the Plan of Sending
British Exhibition Train
Through Canada

Mr. Beime, Secretary of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, in London, interviewed respecting Leo Scheff's statements that Canada was full of chances which were being neglected by British manufacturers, says he fully agrees with Mr. Scheff on every point. British manufacturers are hardly making anything of the marvelous opportunities of Canada, he said, the policy of the Chamber is to encourage Anglo-Canadian trade and the establishment in Canada of branches of the British factories.

Asked as to what industries were most in request, however, he replied that there are industrial openings in practically every important town in Canada. Britishers contemplating building factories in Canada would be amply rewarded by a visit to the Dominion. They should send commercial travellers and then open depots and finally factories. There was no doubt, said Mr. Beime, that financiers and business men were taking a more intimate interest than in the past, but they were still far from realizing their opportunity.

Mr. Beime added that the establishment in Canada of permanent exhibitions of British manufactures should be a good idea and he welcomed the plan of sending an exhibition train through Canada next year.
