Montreal, Nov. 5-Demoralization reigned supreme in the sugar market nere today and no one, refiner or whelesaler, seemed to know what was going on. Leading wholesalers stated that, following repeated drops in the aw sugar, market at New York, with the presistent course of the Domin ion Sugar Rednery of Toronto, which deals in beet sugar, in underselling the care sugar refineries, that the four big cane sugar refineries here had broken away from all agreements as to stabilization of prices and were gelling where and how they could.

PLUMPER GRAIN FROM USE OF FERTILIER

Bulletin No. 243 of the Ohio Ex periment Station discusses the "Effect of Fertilizers on the Physical and Chemical Properties of Wheat."
