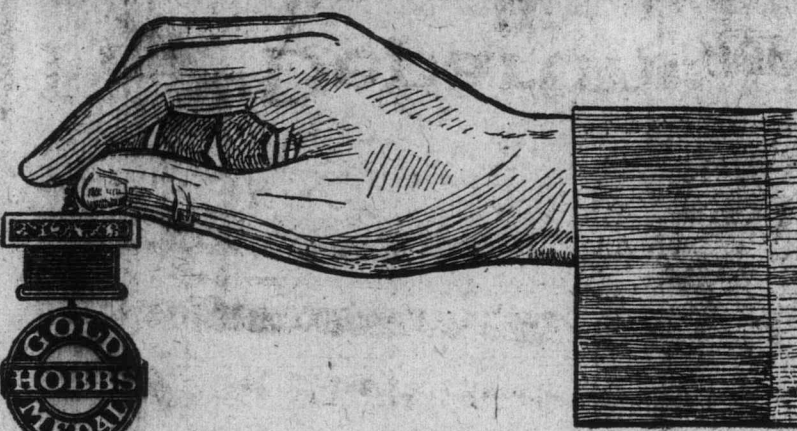

The girl who is quite good looking could easily be taken for twenty. An adjournment was taken until tomorrow morning when T. J. McCarron, counsel for the accused will submit some evidence on behalf of his client.

OLDEND CUNARD SURGEON DIES; IS BURIED AT SEA

HALIFAX, April 12.—The voyage of the steamer Royal George, which arrived in port this morning, from Southampton, direct, was much saddened by the death on April 4th, of the ship's surgeon Dr. James Pointon the oldest surgeon in the Cunard fleet. Dr. Pointon had been ailing for some weeks, but in spite of the advice of his friends would not take to his bed, and on Sunday, while on his way to his cabin, died of angina pectoris sycoph. He was buried at sea on the date of his death. Dr. Pointon had sailed in the Cunard fleet for over thirty years.

Trades and Labor Mass Meeting

He said he had the firemen were quite justified in their demands for an increase of the 25 per cent they had been promised, and then he dealt briefly with the press reports of the City Council claiming that as it was necessary to cut down space, the reporters could not adequately express what really is said in the discussions in the council.

He spoke of pre-election promises. Before election day every candidate had professed being a friend of laborers. Now it is different. He disclaimed all connection with the forming of the firemen's union. It had been formed in December and he personally did not know of it till January.

"Not that I would have objected to helping the firemen," said the alderman, "for I would have been proud to do so." The 25 per cent had been definitely promised the firemen he said.

He announced that Fireman Chestney had agreed to go to the fire hall and fix up the truck which had got out of order.

Ald. Avery spoke of the City Council taking four memberships for city officials in the Chamber of Commerce, an expenditure of \$300 in three years, and of increasing the salaries of the city engineer and city solicitor \$500 and \$250 respectively, yet they could not find a few hundred to give the firemen a living wage.

If this money had been taken and made into a bonus fund the firemen could have had their increase promised them. In any event an over-craft would not have been anything very serious. The city has had over-drafts before this.

The present chairman of the Fire and Light Committee was accused of refusing to confer with the firemen and with wanting a new bridge along the river.

Smash Labor Efforts

Ald. Avery said the aldermen were out to beat the firemen and smash the efforts of Labor to get a stronghold in the council. He feared that not enough Labor aldermen had been elected to the council, because everything that is suggested by himself or his colleagues is immediately turned down on principle.

The firemen have agreed not to interfere with the efforts of the new men and have even offered their services should an emergency arise. Ald. Avery referred to the inequality of city assessment. Workingmen are assessed for practically their full value but those of wealthy men who are worth \$30,000 to \$75,000 are not assessed half their value. He urged workers to get copies of the assessment roll which the city has had published, at the city hall.

Leo Cunningham, secretary of the G. W. V. A., called to his comrades to assist their comrades in the fire brigade by not going into the fire hall to take their places. There was one returned soldier, a fireman, who has a wife and eight children to support. How he could do it on \$80 a month was beyond his reasoning.

"The boys worked long enough at \$1.10 a day," said the secretary; "and now they should surely get something better—a living wage at least."

He said it seemed to be a question of who is boss, not the right of the thing. Certainly if the city engineer cannot live on \$2700 a year, the firemen who buy the same goods and pay the same prices as he does can scarcely be expected to get along on \$80 a month. If the firemen were not doing their duty or were inefficient, they should have been got rid of long ago and not waited until now. The men should be taken back at the increased wages that were promised.

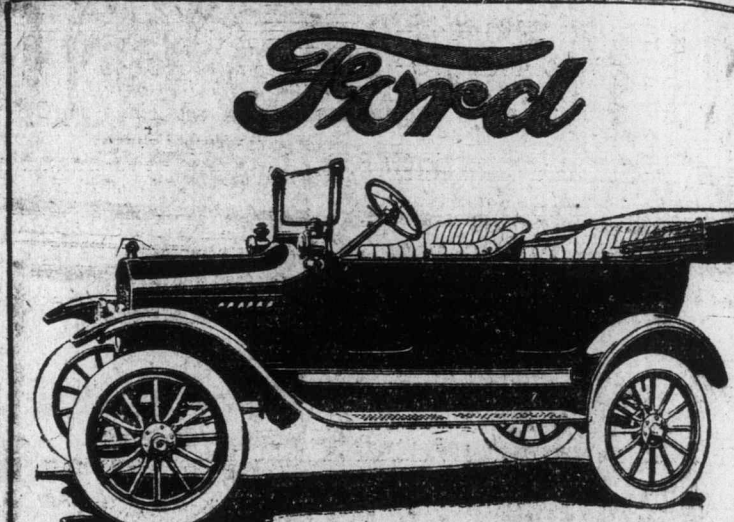
