Cardinal Manning on the Character and Spirit of a True Priest.

In a pastoral letter addressed to the clergy and laity of his diocese on the 12th of May, His Eminence Cardinal Manning discusses the following on "the character and spirit of a true priest":

Our gravest and most anxious duty is to examine and to decide who they are whom God calls to his priesthood. It needs a sure spiritual discernment, prolonged and tested by a watchful care of years.
