Dr. Blair operated Tuesday afternoon and the arm was saved. The child will probably recover.

The new time table gives the cars forty minutes to run from Strathcona to Edmonton, and fifty minutes from Edmonton to Strathcona. Alberta Musical Festival. The annual Alberta Musical Festival has gained a recognized place in the life of the province. Started two years ago in the city of Edmonton it has as its object the uplifting of the diverse art of music throughout the length and breadth of the province. Fashioned somewhat after the annual Elstedsdoffs held annually in Wales and which have become known to the entire province. The interest manifested the first year was phenomenal. Entries came from all parts and when the competitions opened on May 4th, every class was well filled with competitors. The results were gratifying in the extreme. Two competent musicians from the city of Winnipeg were engaged as adjudicators for the first year. At night of the festival a revelation of what the province really possessed. Almost every section of the province was represented, the bulk of the honors being won by the visiting competitors.

With such a beginning the second festival opened under splendid auspices. New features were added, additional prizes being given for female choruses, violinists, societies and bands. Even greater achievement marked the success of this festival. The same time competitors were engaged and noted vast improvement over the preceding year in the various classes. On the closing day the festival the grand concerts have attracted audiences of over two thousand people. At the same time the winning soloists have contributed to the program in addition to a chorus of almost three hundred voices and an orchestra of the best of the province. It was remarked openly by prominent Winnipeg business men who were in attendance last year, that the equal had ever been heard in all the west. Eastern newspapers commented on the success of the festival and the fact that the festival and altogether it has proven of splendid advertising merit to the province at large, and it is an important feature of having increased the desire for and the ability to perform, higher and better standard of music.

Plans for the musical festival for this year have been maturing. This year the number of their competitors has been increased, a gold medal will be given for violin solo playing, and competition in singing, piano, and guitar playing and accompanying have been added. The music has been selected and can be obtained from the secretary, H. H. Griffiths, box 1067, Edmonton, together with all other information. The ready many enquiries are being received and indications point strongly to even greater attendance this year than ever before. (Twelve to be the minimum number of voices in each chorus.) (d) A competition for male quartets. (Twelve to be the minimum number of voices in each chorus.) (e) A competition for amateur vocalists. (f) A competition for amateur pianists. (g) A competition for amateur violinists. (h) A competition for amateur violoncellists. (i) A competition in eight stringing. (j) A competition in eight stringing.

Not a menace to health. The health department has made an investigation into the complaint of citizens of Norwood concerning the Burns slaughter house. This investigation reports that the slaughter house is in a very good sanitary condition, and that the Burns people are as clean as the condition of the building will allow. The floors of this institution are made of plank, which does not furnish as good sanitary conditions as cement floors, but plenty of water is used and the place is kept clean. The complaints and was that was that of the offensive smell that

arose when the slaughter house people were rendering tallow. This can and will be abated, as the Health Officer recommended that the steam that comes from this rendering should be passed through a barrel of water before it is allowed to escape. This will remove the offensive odors and the nuisance will be done away with. Dr. Whitlaw states that it is not the proper place for a slaughter house, and in his report to the commissioners he will ask them to ascertain if the Burns' people really intend to build this season, and if they do not, steps should be taken to remove this place at once.

When asked by the Bulletin if there was any disease arising in the Norwood school on account of this slaughter house, he stated that he had investigated this thoroughly and nothing of the sort had occurred as far as the school or medical authorities could ascertain.

The school has no intention of allowing this slaughter house to remain where it is, as they stated this fact thoroughly at the last meeting of the council, but the question is that if the Burns Company intend to erect an abattoir this season, and nothing serious is resulting from it, they will slaughter there, the city would not make them remove it at the present.

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
