And, What a Finish!

Let Morris finish his work, say the Tories. Has he not blundered enough, and will he not blunder sufficiently to satisfy the hardest shell Tory of them all before the People despatch him for good at the General Election next year?

Let Morris finish his work, say the land grabbers, who have not yet made grabs enough. Has not the Morris Government given away enough timber tracts? Will there be anything left after the Tory timber sharks have been grabbing for another twelve months? What's the trouble? Do they fear that there will be left any unconsidered trifle when the Morris administration is turned out next fall. Why should Morris not be allowed to finish his work of timber granting.

Let Morris finish his work, say the Tory office holders. Morris is all right. We were in a hole about Morris last spring. Morris got out of it by advising the Governor to turn down the Fishermen's Protective Union Memorial, and we are still in power. Morris held the Government together by backing up Morrison's plea that the latter must have forgotten the law when he wrote the Orange Bay letter. Morris kept us in power in spite of those awful disclosures. Morris is great at whitewashing. Why should he not be allowed to finish his work of whitewashing?

Let Morris finish his work, say the Tory romancers. He began a simple story in the House last session about never having had any interest in timber property in any way, direct or indirect. He has not finished the story yet. He is too busy receiving the cold shoulder in Burgeo & LaPelle, St. Barbe's, Bonavista, Harbor Grace and St. John's West. He may not have time to explain that \$40,000 interest in a Lumber Company on the West Coast. Why should he not be allowed to finish his work of explanation?

Let Morris finish his work, say the contract seekers. The Morris administration did not do badly in giving a coastal contract to a company which has two of its directors members of the Morris Ministry. Why should Morris not be allowed to finish his work of presiding over the award of contracts? Morris is all right. He does not balk at a company receiving a contract which has Ministers of the Crown on its directorate.

Let Morris finish his work, say the Tory Tammany men. Why should a Tory Minister be bound by the traditions and practices of the Old Coun-

try? Even if, as the Governor declares, an English Minister, situated as Mr. Morrison was, "would feel himself called upon to resign his post." Why should a Morris Ministry resign? Why should the Morris Ministry live up to the standard of a British Cabinet? In defending Morrison and retaining him, Morris has done much to establish a Tammany standard. Why should Morris not be allowed to finish his work and destroy root and branch the British Cabinet standard?

Heroine in Trouble.

Mr. Patrick McDonald, a well known and esteemed fisherman of Golden Bay, died there a couple of days ago in his 50th year after an illness of two years, leaving a wife and 6 children. His wife six years ago proved herself to be a heroine. A schooner on a dark and stormy night went ashore there and the occupants took to their boat. Mrs. McDonald heard the cries of the men for help, and lighting a lantern and taking her children with her at midnight, issued forth into the storm and gaining the shore, pointed out to the imperilled men the only place they could land with any degree of safety. Not content with this, she guided them to the spot, and rushing out in the water to her shoulders dragged the men ashore, her children holding her and clasping each other's hands, straining in on the shore and thus securing their brave mother from the danger of falling or being swept off in the heavy sea which ran ashore. The men of the craft, owed their lives to her. The heroic woman is now necessarily in straitened circumstances owing to the lengthy illness of her late husband, and her case is one which should receive the attention it merits.
