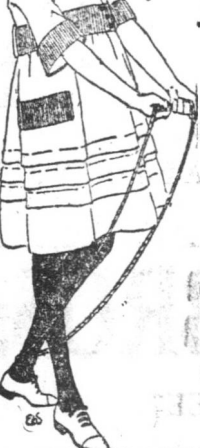

At the City Hall.

The Municipal Council held its regular weekly session last evening. The Mayor presided and Councillors Morris, Brownrigg, Mullaly, Vinnicombe and Tall were present. After reading of minutes etc., the following matters were disposed of:

A requisition for hay for the Sanitary Department was passed and tenders are to be asked.

The Inspector General sent a letter giving consent to the installation of a gasoline tank for Messrs. Job Bros. & Co.

J. P. Callahan wrote further in reference to his claim for damage owing to the alleged bursting of a sewer on Pleasant Street. A motion made in connection with this matter will stand over for enquiry by the Mayor.

Blackwood and Emerson asked for Council's cheque for land taken on Topsail and Waterford Bridge Roads. This will be sent.

They also asked for a reply to their letter re land on Newtown Road. A reply will be sent when matters are considered further.

Reid Nid. Company applied for some second hand pipe at Windsor Lake. This will be sold at the current market price.

J. Crawford quoted price on picking handles. Fyled.

James King was appointed swimming instructor at the Quidi Vidi Pool.

The following plans were approved: James Murdoch, house, Sudbury Street; B. Bowering garage, Topsail Road; James Murdoch, bungalow, Le-Marchant Road, block plan to be sent; Mrs. C. Hynes, repairs and extension, George St.; F. Bursell Out-house, South Side; S. Steenson, house, Brazil's Field; J. B. Orr, garage, Circular Road; N. W. Chown, repairs, New Gower St.; J. C. Oke, garage, Forest Road; Mrs. Hickey, Hayward Avenue, repairs, water and sewerage to be installed; J. Lynch, addition to bakery, Water St.; Chas. Howlett, convert stable into garage, Military Road; John Cook, repairs, Bannerman Street.

James Coffey's application to extend and repair gallery Walsh's Square was referred to the Engineer for report.

John Burke was given permission to repair house Lime Street provided water and sewerage be installed.

J. J. Tobin permitted to repair house Cabot Street.

I. C. Morris was given permission to repair sidewalks Queen Street and George Street. Regarding application for gasoline tank, referred to Inspector General.

G. M. Barr's application to install gasoline tank, Rogerson's Cove, was ordered to be referred to the Inspector General.

The Solicitor reported in re-claims of Mr. Thistle that he was liable according to the Act for water and sewerage rates.

He also stated that contract made with parties in 1918 re water and sewerage installation was now void owing to present market conditions and prices. The owners will be asked to contribute the advanced cost.

The City Engineer reported generally on road work, water and sewerage conditions and other routine matters in the City during the past week.

The Health Officer's weekly report was read.

A requisition for uniforms for the City Inspectors was passed and tenders asked for same.

Councillor Mullaly proposed, seconded by Councillor Brownrigg that a resolution of congratulation be sent, on behalf of the City, to the American Aviators on the success of their achievement in flying from New York to St. John's. This was unanimously agreed to.

Hon. J. J. Murphy appeared before the Council and addressed them on his proposition for an up-to-date telephone system. After discussing the matter at considerable length the matter was deferred for further consideration.

In Memoriam.

On Wednesday, 8th inst., the angel of death visited St. Mary's and claimed for its own the soul of one of our most esteemed and highly respected residents in the person of Mr. Daniel Devine. Deceased was in his 78th year. For many years he had been failing in health and his death was not unexpected. He served as blacksmith for a great number of years, during which he faithfully discharged his duties, and sincere indeed is the grief felt at his demise.

By everyone he was regarded with sentiments of affection and esteem, as his quiet and obliging disposition endeared him to all neighbors around. During his illness he was attended by Rev. Fr. O'Driscoll, P.P., who administered the last rites of Holy Catholic Church. A large concourse of friends and relatives followed his mortal remains on the following Friday to the village cemetery, where he was laid to rest in the family plot.

He is survived by a wife and two sons, Francis and Joseph, and a large circle of relatives, to whom the whole community extends sincere sympathy.
