Older Boys.

The pioneer Older Boys Conference or Newfoundland was held on Saturday afternoon and evening in the Presbyterian Hall, sixty-five boys from the Sunday Schools of the city were present. The sessions were interesting and profitable throughout, and the conference did much to stimulate interest in religious work among older boys. Rev. Oliver Jackson occupied the chair during the afternoon. The opening address was given by Rev. Dr. Jones. He spoke of the necessity for four-fold development along physical, intellectual, religious and social lines. Rev. D. B. Hemmeon spoke on the boy and the community and asked the help of the boys in the care of property, the observance of law and securing cleaner streets in the city. Dr. Grieve spoke on the care of health and the strengthening of powers of endurance. After these addresses the conference adjourned to the gymnasium of the Methodist College, where an exhibition of gymnastic work was given by a number of the Methodist College boys under the direction of Mr. T. F. Beresford and he leadership of Mr. Fowler. A route march was then held through some of the city streets, which wound up at the Presbyterian Hall. There an appetizing bean supper awaited the delegation and an enjoyable hour was spent in social fellowship and the inging of popular songs. Lantern ides of the 1919 camp of the Gower Scouts were thrown on the screen. the evening session the chair was aken by Mr. Arthur Mews. A quesion box on methods of work was conducted by Rev. E. W. Forbes. Mr. Jackson charted a boy, according to Canadian Efficiency Standard Tests and explained the meaning of the "C. S.E.T." The closing address on the investment of life was given by Rev. H. Hamilton of the Presbyterian Church. A vote of thanks to the ladies and gentlemen who had provided and served the bean supper was unanimously passed. Great credit attaches to Mr. Jackson for the success both of the Teachers' Institute and the Boys' Conference, and it is hoped that the latter will be made an annual affair in the


