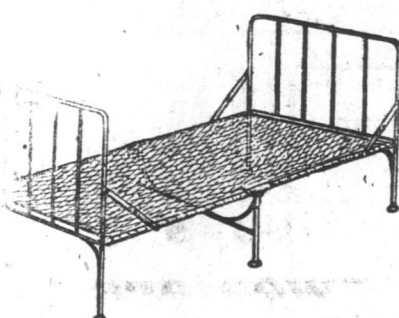

Produce and Provisions

(Trade Review.)

Codfish—This was a record week in handling codfish for shipment to foreign markets owing to the favorable weather prevailing. The shipments from St. John's were as follows:—by S.S. Studholm, 19,356 qts. to Seattle, from various shippers here and in the outports; by schr. Cape Race, 8,000 qts. from Juan Lazo & Co. to their principals in Seattle; by S.S. Nico, 10,000 qts. of Labrador to Bilbao, Spain, from A. H. Murray; by Ida M. Zinck, 2,400 qts. from Lazo & Co. to San Juan, Porto Rico; by S.S. Sachem, 198 qts. to Boston; by S.S. Rosalind, 2,808 qts. from various shippers to N.Y. for West Indies. From outports: by schr. Astoria from Bay Bulls, 4,500 qts. to Seattle, Spain, shipped by Juan Lazo & Co.; by schr. Aphrodite from Rose Blanche, 1,346 qts. to Lisbon, shipped by Wm. Horwood & Co., and by schr. Corsair from Lamaline, 2,398 qts. exported by Lake & Lake, to Halifax. Total 50,846 qts. The prices in the foreign markets are keeping up well and Spain is now taking quite a big lot of fish. Labrador quality in the local market is now very scarce, and \$45 per five qt. cask was offered this week to make up consignments. The regular price for unpacked Labrador is \$8 to \$20, according to quality, and shore fish runs from \$9 to \$9.80 per qt. The West India market is improving, and the congestion of badly cured fish there is considerably relieved by improvement in consumption since October. Norwegian stocks have dropped off in Oporto to about 9,000 qts., which looks as if their supply was becoming exhausted. Ours is under 40,000 qts., which is very well for this time of the year, as it is only about five weeks' consumption at the rate prevailing since October. The demand is expected to increase coming on towards Xmas, so that this market looks safe for good business for Newfoundland shippers in view of the fact that there is such a limited quantity available in this market. The situation is helped out for local shippers by the excellent improvement in exchange.

Common Cod Oil—There has been more enquiries, and it looks as if this market will be cleaned up very quickly. There is no advance in prices and all are perfectly willing to dispose of stocks on hand at present values. Notwithstanding the very short catch of fish the supply of oil being received is better than expected. This has been caused by the exceedingly good yield of the cod fish during the past season. The last year was fully two weeks or more earlier than usual, and the fish, when they arrived on the coast, had already been feeding on the 'caplin, which was an unusual occurrence and had probably something to do with the extra yield of oil from the livers.

Cod Liver Oil—The outlook is much brighter than it has been for some time and let us hope that there will be a substantial increase in the price next year with some encouragement for our refiners to prosecute the business. Foreign markets are active and firm but as prices have been so abnormally low we must see a considerable advance before anything worth while can be done. Scientific reports continue in the principal drug magazines.

Flour—The wheat market was very strong during the week although the advance was only a few points. Local importers have raised their prices on flour slightly but they are still under the cost of importation. In fact flour has been selling in this market all the fall slightly below replacement cost. The St. John's quotations this week are fifteen cents per barrel over last week and are as follows:—\$9.50 per barrel wholesale for Windsor Patient and Royal Household; \$9.40 for Pilbury's Best and \$9.10 to \$9.30 second qualities. The imports were heavy this week as importers were taking advantage of the cheaper freights by the all water route from Montreal, which will be closed in a few days.

Pork—The market in some brands of pork is slightly easier this week and a few lots of ham butt have been bought at more favorable rates than the previous week. Fat Back is also quoted a shade lower in New York. This is regarded as a temporary weakening and does not affect present prices in the local market. Ham Butt is very limited. The quotations by wholesalers here this week are \$32 for Fat Back and S. C. Clear; \$36 for Ham Butt and \$34.50 for Mops.

Beef—There is no change in the beef market worth recording. The uniform tone that prevailed all the season is still in evidence. The only brand that has made any decline in the foreign market is Boneless, which is now \$1.00 per barrel cheaper than it was six weeks ago. Dealers are looking forward to an unchanged market during the winter. Quotations this week are: \$21.75 for Family Special and Boneless Flanks; \$24.00 Extra Family, and \$27.00 Bone Flank, medium.

Masses—There is no interest in the molasses market these days, and there will not be until the new crop is ready. The general opinion amongst dealers is that the prices will open easier than the 1924 figures. Local stocks were drained so heavily this fall by outport trade that as the hold-

First prize in cheese went to the Eastern Dairy School, at Kingston, the second to the Lanark and Drummond Factory, Lanark, and the third to the Kilmarnock Factory, Kilmarnock. First prize in honey went to West Bros., Thornton, Ont., and second prize to John McKinnon, St. Eugene. All the prizes in butter went to Australia, and South Africa won everything in eggs.

Misfortunes Fall Heavily on This Family

HOUSE WAS BURNED AFTER SHE HAD BEEN TAKEN TO HOSPITAL.

Her home in ashes, her eldest son in hospital as the result of injuries sustained in Halloween, Mrs. Margaret Waugh died at the General Hospital to-day.

Misfortunes have come thick and fast to the bereaved family. When the sons—James, 16, and William, 14—returned home at 6 o'clock Friday evening in anticipation of an evening of fun they found their mother ill and lying on the floor. They had to force their way into the home.

The mother was taken to the hospital, and the two boys visited her during the evening. Later they returned to their lonely home, 2731 Robinson Street, and retired. After midnight they were awakened by the smell of smoke and rushed out to notify neighbours. James, the elder, was injured in jumping through a window, and so, within a few hours, was in the same hospital as his mother as a patient. The older boy is still in hospital and is recovering. The younger boy was taken away to live with a friend. Their home and its contents were practically destroyed by the fire.

The mother failed to rally at the hospital and death came to-day. Her age is given as 40 years.—Extract from a Regina paper, Nov. 5.

Trade Success Feature of Wembley Exhibition

LONDON, Nov. 14 (A.P.)—If the Wembley Exhibition has not been a financial success to the promoters, it has been an unqualified success from the point of view of sales and orders. Many new markets, it is declared, have been created through the exposure of goods, and some Canadian and Australian manufacturers have sold their outputs for the next five years.

Among the big business deals concluded, the following are recorded: One engineering firm received orders for five different municipalities for an equal number of electrical generating installations; a provincial grocer increased his sale of New Zealand butter by 100 per cent. in two months; a Canadian dried milk dealer sold his output for the next five years to a British firm; one million boxes of Canadian fruit were ordered by European buyers; sales in the Indian Pavilion amounted to £250,000 in three months; the Little colony of Cyprus was overwhelmed with orders; one French firm asked for 20,000 dozen boot heels, and another dealer ordered £145,000 worth of Cyprus asbestos.
