## Local and Other Items

**MR. HARCOURT, ex-M. P.** for Haldimand died on Tuesday.

**OFF THE TRACK.**—The morning on the G. T. R. from Toronto to-day delayed two hours near Aclon, by a train which had run-off the track.

**MR. STREET.**—The St. Catharines is sorry to hear that Mr. Street is low. Judging from present appearances it is not likely that he will again see the inside of the Capitol building, even if he should be recovered, which is not very probable. Mr. Street's state of health is such that his friends could have no other desire to see him spend the rest of his life whether long or short, in the quiet private life.

**HARVESTING IN THE GORE OF PUS.**—A correspondent of the Galt Register says:—The harvesting has commenced and hands are extremely scarce. The wheat is tolerably good, notwithstanding the severe drought, and the cutting is going on. Hay is all secured, the fall below the average. Turnips are beginning to show themselves though appearances have all along been against them. Potatoes look well. Oats in straw and will be a poor crop, nowhere.

**MEMOIR OF DR. KITTO.**—The name of Dr. Kitto is one that we all speak of with respect and reverence. After he has written some large and valuable works which have been of untold value to the world, he composed this best and one called "The History of the Bible" a compendium or summing up in a condensed form of all his useful knowledge. In this we get the benefit of his travels and learning of his life. It contains more valuable maps and than any other similar work with which we are acquainted. His works were much valued that the Queen of England conferred upon him a pension of £500 a year, a slight token of her respect for his account of the good he had done to Great Britain. He was the only one who had ever received the title of a minister. This honorary title conferred upon him by the colleges of England and Scotland. He lay claim to him and both may be proud of him.

**LOCK-OUT IN THE BUILDING TRADE.** The lock-out in the building trade of old London terminated to some extent on July 6. On the previous day a delegation from the Masons' Committee, the Masters' Committee, and after interview of upward of six hours, it was agreed that the working hours should be reduced to 5 1/2 per week, the men to make up the shorter hours during winter they cannot see to work in winter working longer hours in summer. Saturday they are to leave off at 12. Wages are to be increased from 8 to 9 per hour. These terms were after accepted by the men at a mass meeting although a minority opposed the proposition on the ground that it had not been committed to the carpenters and joiners, whom they had been associated with in the strike. The carpenters were indignant when they heard of the promise—for so they term the settlement—alleging that it is neither the nine hours nor the ninepence for which they struck—which had been secured by the men. They refused to accept the same terms for themselves. The result will either be that the carpenters will accept the terms or that the strike will go on with a feeling of greater bitterness.

**Base Ball Notes.** The match for the championship between the Guelph Maple Leaf and Listowel Red Stockings comes off tomorrow, on the grounds here, game to begin at 2.30. The Second Nine of the Unions play a match with the Independents for on Thursday afternoon. The return match between the Unions of this town and the Athletics of Elm is to be played on the Fair Ground, as was on the Maple Leaf Ground, as was correctly published yesterday.

**NEWS ITEMS.** Hon. Mr. Mackenzie speaks in Toronto on Wednesday evening. Mr. Atkinson, who was expected to pose Mr. Mills, has backed out. Josie Mansfield, who has visited Guelph, was refused admission to two principal hotels. Trade is reported very dull in Paris consequence of a monetary crisis. said thousands of shops are closed. The earth over a coal mine at Straton, Pa., caved in lately, swallowing two houses and burying two little girls in the ruins. Five cases of accidental drowning occurred in the Detroit River during the week ending Saturday, the 20th inst. Two young men, two belonged to the Guelph side, and three to the American side. The Grand Encampment of I. O. O. F. of Ontario is to meet in Windsor on the 6th of August next, and the Grand Lodge of Ontario will follow on the following day. Mr. Alex. Smith, of Blanshard on river Thames, commenced cutting acres of fall wheat on Monday last, although partially winter killed, estimated to yield thirty bushels to the acre. A fire in Georgetown on Sunday evening destroyed Harley's wagon with most of its contents. Mr. Switzer, who accidentally shot himself in Georgetown last week died Monday morning.
