WATCH THE YOUNG WHEAT PLANTS

Every farmer who grows any considerable acreage of wheat should make it his business to keep a careful watch on the wheat plants from the time they break through the ground this fall until they are ready for harvest next summer. He may learn much of value and much to guide him in his treatment of the crop of next year. We watch carefully the young calf in its different stages of growth and by the story it tells, we are guided in our treatment of the next. The wheat plant, too, has a story to tell and we only are at fault if we do not heed and profit by the story. Watch the crop carefully this fall, next winter and next spring, and let it answer your questions. Did the young plants start growth rapidly and vigorously? Where they able to get a good foothold in the ground before the frost came? Did they send out sufficient foliage in the fall to protect themselves over winter? Did the winter kill out some of them? Why? And could the number have been reduced? Do they look thrifty when spring comes or are they reared and stunted? How do they react when disease attacks them? And lastly, what is the tale that harvest tells? If it is a good one you are on the right track. If it is measured by 10 or 15 bushels of poor or mediocre grain, something is wrong. Go back over the story of the crop and chances are that you will find the cause. The crop will tell the story if you will stop & look.

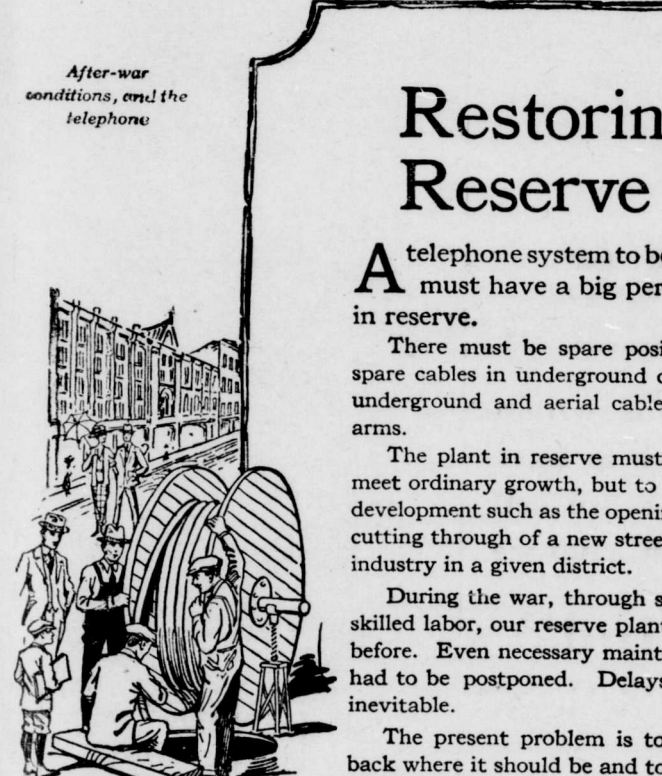
