### The Uganda Railway Runs Through a Vast "Natural Zoological Gardens."

Of the few countries remaining where herds of wild animals may still be seen in almost the same numbers as in the days of the early travellers, British East Africa comes easily first, while it is the most accessible and the best known. Indeed, as is well known, the Uganda railway runs for part of the route through a vast "natural zoological gardens," where the animals are to all intents and purposes perfectly wild, excepting in so far as this zoo is a big game preserve. It is this railway which has, no doubt, robbed the journey from the coast of the terrors of its waterless marches, and has at the same time destroyed the romance of the old days. ## BURIED THE P.A.T.

While, however, some may regret the march of civilization, we still owe a debt of gratitude to the same civilization which has instituted a system of game preserves for the preservation of wild animals.

Throughout the world men have realized the lessons of a generation ago, and the slaughter of the bison in North America and of the white rhinoceros in South America—two famous instances—has resulted in a wide application of protective laws. That there must be a difference of opinion on such a subject is inevitable, and we find to-day advocates of the abolition of game as keen on its destruction as others are on its preservation.

That stock diseases are conveyed by various insects is an undoubted truth, and until some preventive treatment gives absolute immunity from these plagues, the argument is a strong one. But science advances daily, and with bacteriological research and modern methods, the day cannot be far distant when this immunity will be obtained.

A further reason given against game preservation in East Africa is that fencing is frequently broken by the stampede of a frightened herd of zebra or hartebeest, while yet another claim lies in the fact that so long as these animals inhabit the country there must be lions—a

## MENACE TO MAN AND BEAST.

The partial solution of the difficulties seems to lie in the reservation of districts which are least likely to be used for European settlement and this is to some extent now being done.

The policy would serve the same purpose as the game laws, which have for many years been passed for the purpose of limiting the number of specimens which visitors or residents may kill.

It is not too much to hope that the camera will to a large extent replace the rifle, and a big game photographing expedition will be recognized as the only legitimate one with rhinoceros, elephants, buffalo and lions may be expected, and while it is not possible for even a photographer to withhold his fire in the case of a charging animal, we believe that the ordinary "bush hunter," whose quarry lacks any power to retaliate will place to the man who photographs the antelope and gazelle, and only seriously chases the dangerous game.

## BABE HOOKS EYES ON CARD.

### Little Victim of English Sweated Labor Just Two and a Half.

A baby aged two and a half years, who "works" for his living by hooking eyes on a card for his living, working mother, has been discovered in London. By working all day until 11 p.m., together they earn \$1.12 a week. This little victim of sweated child labor—surely the youngest in the country—is mentioned by a writer in the *Empire Review*, on "The Problem of the Child."

"I have seen a baby of two and a half years hooking eyes," says the writer, "so unchildlike at 30 months that he had not the curiosity to look up from his work as we talked with the mother."

"Gravely and industriously this baby toiler placed hook after hook in its place on the card, saving a few minutes every hour to the mother who earns 75c a week at the most monotonous, weary, dead-end type of 'woman's work' that exists. There are twelve books and eyes on each card, and the worker is paid 20c for every book of cards. First she sews the books on to the cards and the child hooks each book with an eye. Then the eyes are stitched in place."

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

## A DIMINISHING DOG.



# 1,000,000 MEN UNDER ARMS.

## Germany's Field Manoeuvres This Summer.

Germany will have under arms in connection with field manoeuvres this summer practically one million men. In addition to the regular army with a strength of 622,000 men, over 355,000 reservists will be called to the colors, making a total effective strength for the army of 977,000. Adding to this men serving with the fleet, an armed force of considerably more than a million will be engaged in the gigantic war game.

The new firing regulations for the field artillery, just published, contain in addition to further directions for fire against captive balloons, a new set of instructions governing the use of the artillery against dirigibles and aeroplanes. It is admitted, however, that artillery fire against aeroplanes offers slight chance of success without enormous use of ammunition.



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
