Shorthand a Necessity to the Editor of the ADVERTISER.

While the Board of Education is so busy making changes in the management of the sublic schools, I would like to suggest that the schools are restler an adventise of the sublic schools. walting changes in the management of the public schools, I would like to suggest that they make a change in, or rather an addition to the curriculum. In these days of specialization a boy intending to go into mercantile life has not time to master the Greek verb nor trace his way through the maze of molecules, atoms and ultimates of physical science, nor yet has he time to crowd his head full of the minutie or "learned dust" so often mistaken for true culture. The questions asked by managers of commercial and monetary institutions when employing a youth are not, "Are you well up in Greek syntax?" or "Can you give the scientific theory of light and heat?" But the questions asked are: "De you write a good hand?" "Are you good at figures?" and last and all important, "De you write a good hand?" "Without a knowledge of shorthand?" Without a knowledge of shorthand it is almost impossible for a youth to obtain a position in a house of any standing. It is the prime requisite—after brains—and in our public schools there is no provision made to teach it. It is pleasant and useful to know who Homer is supposed to have been and to read what he wrote, but it is fully as pleasant, and ever so much more practical, to know who Isaac Piman was, and to have mastered what he taught. Shorthand might be added to the Collegiate Institute course, as an option. It need in no way interfere with the efficiency of the school in other departments, and would give pupils preparing for business a chance to properly equip themselves. The above is simply thrown out by way of suggestion, and I would like to see the matter taken up and discussed. Yours truly, Parent.

This was against the rules of the union, and that factory was de-clared a scab shop.
