SARINIA OBSERVER: "The Tory Em-
pire has raised the cry: 'The Grits are on
the run.' So they are. And this is the
time of year when runs count. The score
is bound to be a big one on June 5."

A LEADING Tory paper in Toronto
pitches into Dr. Caven, president of the
Equal Rights Association. The Doctor is
a friend and supporter of Hon. Oliver
Mowat and that is enough. "Away with
him!" is the cry.

"The clamor and vapors of busy
demagogues" is what Mr. S. H. Blake, the
distinguished Toronto philanthropist and
religious leader, calls the Tory attack on
the Mowat Administration. He sizes the
Meredith faction up well.

THE color line is as far from being
obliterated in the United States as ever.
At the Episcopal Diocesan Convention, sit-
ting in Charleston, S. C., it has been re-
solved to admit no more negro delegates to
seats. The Christianity of some people is
liable to be questioned.

IN EAST ALBAMA, the Meredith policy is
so thoroughly discredited that no one could
be got to run against the Liberal member.
The Tory bosses have presented A. F.
Campbell, of Brampton, as a candidate to
keep Mr. Lyon at home—but he cannot
defeat that tried servant of the people.

LIBERALISM is on the top these days. The
Liberal candidate in the East Bristol Im-
perial election on Friday was elected by a
largely increased majority over the record
of the previous contest; and in Costa
Rica, Senor Don Jose Rodriguez, a pro-
nounced Liberal, has just been placed in
the President's chair.

INSURANCE companies are now "totting"
up their losses by the grip. The Canadian
companies escaped with comparatively
little loss, but in the United States the in-
crease of deaths in the period dur-
ing which the epidemic prevailed
was enormous. Reports of 29 life com-
panies over the border, for the first quarter
of 1890 show an increase of 29 per cent.
in the death rate over the same period of 1889.
The losses from pneumonia and bronchitis
last year were \$67,036 greater than last
year.

IN CONNECTION with the Rykert scandal,
it must not be forgotten that the Tory
M.P. at Ottawa defended the unscrupulous
and untruthful man as long as they possibly
could. Sir John Thompson even drew up
and insisted upon the passage of a report
whitewashing Rykert; but Hon. E. Blake
and the Liberal members of the Investi-
gating Committee strenuously resisted the
passage of the exonerating statement of the
case, and Mr. Blake's fair declaration of
what has been discovered and condem-
nation of the guilty one was adopted.

IF WE are to believe the New York in-
surance men, there is as yet something
radically wrong in the working of the
average electric lighting apparatus. In
that city in 1886 the electric wires and
lights were responsible for the destruction
of \$400,000 worth of property, but
last year property to the value of no less
than \$5,533,000 was destroyed by the same
agency. The underwriters have reached
the decision, however, that the light has
come to stay, and that what has now to be
done is to devise means to make it as harm-
less as possible, for which purpose the aid
of the scientist is to be invoked. This is
an important problem, and the man who
solves it is worthy of a substantial reward.

DR. FLEMING, of Chatham, will make a
strong candidate in West Kent, and there
is little doubt that he will be elected by a
handsome majority over Mr. Clancy. He
is a man of excellent ability and is heartily
supported by all the Liberals in the con-
stituency. Besides, he possesses the ad-
vantage of supporting a Government that
deserves and enjoys the confidence of the
people of Ontario. It is a matter of just
pride to the Liberal party of this Province
that they can point to political leaders who
have ruled uninterruptedly for over
eighteen years, without so much as a blem-
ish resting upon their reputation, and who
besides have made a record as legislators
and administrators such as finds no parallel
in any other commonwealth in America.
Dr. Fleming has no shady transactions of
Government to defend. He belongs to a
clean and progressive party, and his own
sterling worth will make the assurance of
his victory doubly sure. Mr. Clancy is go-
ing to retire from political life.

THE TRUE INWARDNESS OF ACRY.

Mr. Awey, M.P.P., speaking in South
Wentworth, the other day, had this to say
on the question of speaking French in the
Eastern township schools:

In 1885 Hon. Mr. Ross said he thought it
was time that English was thoroughly taught
in schools in French districts, and by a system
of kindness started the reformation. This was
about it. Let me tell you a little secret. So
long as these French counties sent Con-
servatives to the Ontario House the Opposi-
tion never said a word about the French
schools, but as soon as the people began to
be enlightened on public questions, and sent
Reform members to the House, then the
French schools were heard about. (Laughter.)
The leader of the Opposition when he made
his trip down east became sympathetic and
religiously when he traveled among the French-
men. In his speech he talked of them in
terms most laudatory.

And if the Meredith crowd could induce
the electors in the Eastern townships to once
more support their candidates, they would
blackguard the Ontario Government for
taking away the liberties of the French-
speaking people. We would have Mr.
Meredith, Mr. French, Sol. White and the
rest of them pitching into Mr. Mowat for
alleged unfair treatment of the French-
Canadian settlers who have reclaimed the
swamps and poor lands in the valley of the
Ottawa. Not so very long ago, indeed, as
pointed out by Mr. Purdom at his London
South meeting, Sir John Macdonald ap-
pealed to the race prejudices of the French-
speaking people in Eastern Ontario, and
tried to gain additional support for the Tory
candidates, by asserting that Premier Mowat
had unfairly discriminated against that
section of the people in the counties border-
ing on the Ottawa. At that time the Tory

leader's great anxiety was to have more
French-speaking members in the Legisla-
ture. At present it suits the purpose of the
mischievous, hungry office-seekers to
preach a directly contrary doctrine. But
let it be remembered that the preaching is
not taking place in the border counties.
It is reserved for constituencies
which the Meredith gang believe
can be misled by appeals to race
and religious prejudices. In the Eastern
counties the Tory canvassers are still ad-
hering to the doctrine enunciated by Sir
John Macdonald, whose leadership Mer-
edith acknowledges, whose paid organizer,
Birmingham, is bossing the Meredith
campaign at this very moment. A more
reprehensible attempt to stir up race and
sectarian strife, for the purpose of political
gain, could scarcely be imagined. The
electors, we doubt not, will effectively re-
buke it on the 5th of June.

TREATMENT OF INEBRIATES.

A number of our contemporaries look
with favor upon the proposition to regard
drunkenness as, in the main, a disease,
and to provide for the treatment of con-
firmed inebriates in asylums, just as we treat
the insane in establishments specially pro-
vided for them. The subject was recently
discussed in these columns, on the basis of
a letter by Mr. W. Y. Brunton, of this city,
who suggested that a hospital of this kind
should be established, placed under the
control and supported entirely
by the Government, the "funds" to be pro-
vided from excise duties on alcoholic
beverages and on customs duties of the
same. This proposition the Monetary
Times discusses at length. It agrees with
the ADVERTISER that inebriety in some
cases is a vice, though one which impris-
onment will not cure, but will in many in-
stances defeat the object sought to be at-
tained. Addition to excessive alcohol
drinking is a disease, and should be treated
as such. The question has always been,
how can the reform be brought about? Our
contemporary points out that "in Canada
there are but few institutions where in-
ebriates are treated; in Ontario only one.
All these institutions are the result of
private enterprise, they do not receive any
support from the State, and are entirely de-
pendent upon the revenue derived from the
patients themselves. Hence the cost of main-
tenance is high, and the doors of such places
are practically closed to all but those who
are in affluent or moderate circumstances.
The unfortunate inebriate who is poor-
house, and such persons constitute the largest
class—must go on, his disease increasing,
impoverishing his family and pushing him
headlong into the grave. The State has
recognized its duty in making provision on
an extensive scale for other maladies. The
insane, the idiot, the blind and the deaf
have all been provided for. General hospi-
tals, orphanages and houses of refuge re-
ceive State aid, but the unfortunate inebri-
ate, who is as much the subject of disease
as any of the classes named above, has been
lamentably neglected. Besides having as
much right as any of the others to be cared
for, he has this additional claim on the
State, that the latter deals out to him the
deleterious substance which has proved to
be the cause of his disease and derives a
large revenue therefrom. If a small per-
centage of the money derived from the tax
upon alcohol and the licenses for the sale
thereof were set aside to build and main-
tain inebriate asylums, provision
could be made for a large number of those
requiring the care, protection, and scientific
treatment obtainable in such an institution.
This appears to be the clear duty of the
State, and should not be neglected or left
to be paid for out of the pockets of philan-
thropists."

THE OLD MEN.

There was an interesting editorial in the
Morning Post, London, which suggested a
reason for the vigorous health of our Sir John
Macdonald and Mr. Mowat, the 80-year old
Gladstone and the veteran Bismarck. We
reprint part of it for the benefit of our
readers:
"How is it that some men, chiefly those
who have stood prominently before the pub-
lic for so many years, remain young in spite
of their old age. They have not found the
fountain of perennial youth, nor have they
been introduced to the elixir of life. Yet, in
a measure, they have really made a dis-
covery. They have learned that the employ-
ment of the mind and body is highly con-
ducive to long life.
"It is to be remembered that work, like
food, sleep and other agencies, must be
taken in moderation; it must be tempered
by seasons of rest and recuperation." In
this we hear again the warning of the medi-
