### CUTTING OUT WORK FOR THE

The Veterinary College at Toronto, over which Dr. Smith so worthily presides, enjoys a goodly reputation at home and abroad. At the term which closed a few days ago a large majority of the graduates were from the United States, and out of a total of about 400 students some 250 were Americans. There are a number of veterinary schools in the States, some

of which are under university managemest; but none are deserving to be ranked with the Toronto one, and in none of them is there such a roll of students. Dr. Smith is deserving of credit for the work he has done, and we hope he will not rest content with what he has already accomplished. In one respect there is room for improvement, viz., the literary qualification of students and graduates. Marked progress has been made in this direction during the last quarter of a century by the medical profession, and we are confident that practitioners of the veterinary art would be greatly benefited also were a higher literary qualification re-quired of them. General intelligence counts for much in the professional man, and especially that intelligence which enables him to present his thoughts, observation and experience with clearness and precision. Let Dr. Smith, then, seek to raise the standard of intelligence at his college, and he will not fail to make the veterinary profession more honored than it now is; nor yet to secure for the college a greater reputation than it now enjoys. Why should there not be a department of veterinary science in connection with the Provincial University as well as a department of medical science? If that arrange-

ment could be made the literary part of the surriculum might easily be arranged.

But think of 450 veterinary students in attendance at one school! Where do they all find a living practice? Some of them may have had a scanty enough one in the past, but it will not be the fault of Secretary Rusk, of the United States Department of Agriculture if they do not fare bet ter in the near future. The Secretary, upon receipt of the application, will give the establishment an official number, by which all its inspected products will thereafter be known and this number will be used both by the inspectors of the Agricultural Department and by the owners of the establishment to mark the products of the establishment The Secretary will appolance annumber.

The inspector appointed, and all employes under his direction, shall have full and free access at all times to all parts of the building or buildings used in the slaughter of live animals and the conversion of their carcases into food products. The veterinary inspector in charge of the establishment will carefully inspect all animals in the pens of the establishment about to be slaughtered, and no animal shall be allowed to pass to the staughtering-room until it has been so inspected. Whenever any animal is found on inspection to be diseased the animal shall be condemned by the inspector, and the owner shall at once remove it from the premises and dispose of it in such manner as may be provided by the laws of the State.

The veterinary inspector or his assistant shall carefully inspect at time of slaughter all animals slaughtered at said establishment, and make a post mortem examination, be found to be diseased, and unfit for human food, the carcass shall at once be removed from the establishment, under the supervision of the inspector, and be disposed of in the manner provided by the laws of the State where slaughtered.

The carcasses of cattle which leave establishments as dressed beef will be stamped with a numbered stamp issued by the Department of Agriculture by the inspector, and a record will be sent to the department at Washington. The inspection of swine for export or interstate trade will be conducted in the same manner as prescribed in the foregoing rules, with the addition, however, that a microscopic examination for trichinne will be required for all swine products. The inspector in charge of the slaughtering or other establishments will issue a certificate of inspection for all carcasses of animals or food products which are to be exported into foreign countries, which certificate will cite the number of factory and the name of the consignee and country to which the same is to be exported.




