GLADSTONE'S GREATNESS. London, Oct. 8 .- Mr. Gladstone, with his 86th birthday close at hand, is planning another foreign journey. He will probably visit Lord Rendel at Cannes, and go to Biarritz afterward. Since his retirement from the House of Commons there is a marked change of tone in public references to him. His former opponents no longer speak bitterly of him; partizan resentment is passing away; men of all parties have begun to recognize in him the great figure in the Victorian age, in whose fame and intellectual eminence Eng-

lishmen may well glory. THE POET LAUREATESHIP. London, Oct. 8 .- Ever since Tenny. son's death a strong party has supported the claims of Sir Edwin Arnold to the poet laureateship. Lord Salisbury's accession to power, in the opinion of most people, made the selection of Sir Edwin seucre, for he is one of the editors of the Daily Telegraph, the most awson proprieto of the Daily Telegraph, has been canvassing vigorously in Sir Edwin Arnold's behalf, and, it is believed, pear in an early issue of the Official Gazette, pending which, etiquette for-

oids anyone concerned to say anything about it. THE PARNELLITES. Dublin, Oct. 8.-At the convention of the Parnellite party yesterday resolutions in regard to home rule and amnesty for political prisoners were passed. Sir John Redmond, during the course of a speech, said that unless the freedom of Ireland is granted, in case of war, it would be to the tune of "The Marseillais" that they would march, and not to that of "God Save

FREE LABOR CONGRESS. London, Oct. 8.-The Free Labor Con-

gress opened its session at Newcastle yesterday, with 80 delegates in attendance. A letter was read from Mr. Thos. Burt, M.P., in which he expressed hope that the efforts of the congress to obtain the creation of boards of arbitra-tion to act in the settlement of disputes between employers and employes would be successful. President Chandler, in his opening address, made an attack upon trades unions, which he declared were manipulated by selfseekers, whose tyranny disgraced the cause of labor and struck a heavy blow at the trade of the nation. The Free Labor Association, he said, was cultivating better relations between employers and employed, and aimed at the prevention of senseless strikes. The association, he said, had already effected the formation in many inpor-tant industrial centers of boards of conciliation consisting of equal numbers of masters and workmen. All of these boards, he said, were working in perfect harmony.

GREAT DAY FOR THE DUCHESS. London, Oct. 8.-Lady William Beresford, formerly the Duchess of Marlborough, and before that Mrs. Hamersley, had Saturday the felicity of acting as hostess to the Prince of Wales at Deepdene, Surrey. This is not the first time the prince has been the guest of an American woman, but the honor this time is an unusually great one, for his royal highness spends from Saturday till Monday with her highly favored ladyship. Envious people, and they are numerous, declare that the honor is due only to the fact that her third husband is an old friend of the Prince of Wales. The prince's friends

Sir James Robert Drummond, G.C.B., K.C.B., Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod (sergeant-at-arms), is dead. Sia James Robert Drummond was born in 1812. He was the second son of Viscount Strathallan, and married, in 1856, Catherine, daughter of the late Admiral, the Hon. Sir George Elliot, K.C.B. He commanded the British warship Retribution at the bombardments of Odessa and Sebastopol in 1854, was a Lord of the Admiralty from 1858 to 1859, and from 1861 to 1864. From 1858 to 1861 he was commander of Woolwiich dockyard. The late admiral has also been naval aide-de-camp to the Queen, superintendent of Devonport dockyard and commander-in-chief of the British Mediterranean squadron.

MADAGASCAR'S CAPITAL CAPTURED Port Louis, Island of Mauritus, Oct. 8 .-Advices received here today from the Island of Madagascar announce that the French expeditionary force which has been advancing upon the capital for many weeks' past, captured Antananarivo on Sept. 27. The prime minister and the court, it is added, fled to Ambosistra. The news was brought to the coast by couriers from Vatomaudry on Sept. 30. Despatches received from Tamatave say that Faralatra was bombarded by the French on Oct. 2, and that it was also attacked by assault on the following

Paris, Oct. 8.—When the foregoing dispatch from Port Louis was received this morning announcing the capture of Antananarivo, the capital of the Island of Madagascar, by the French troops, it was the source of great relief to the Government as it had been recognized for some time past that the defeat of the French troops would mean a change of ministry. The news of the victory quickly spread throughout the city, causing great excitement and much reloicing.
