ROUTE OF THE LANTERN PARADE.

The following route has been determined upon by the London Bicycle Club for their grand lantern parade to-night. It will be one of the most interesting sights ever beheld in the city, and should be witnessed by everybody. Leave club rooms at 8 o'clock sharp to Queen's Park, circle around Richmond, north to "Graydon's Park" and circle around Victoria Park, coming out at south-west entrance; thence west on Dufferin avenue to Richmond, south to Dundas, east to Queen's Park, circle around and west to Adelaide, south to King, west to Talbot, north to Queen's avenue, east on Queen's avenue and back to club rooms.

DISASTROUS FINISH.

The five-mile bicycle race for the championship of Scotland, which took place at Edinburgh on the 22nd ult., had a disastrous finish, owing to Vogt, in attempting to cut at the corner of the back straight, bringing down all the riders but two. So serious was the collision that, when the mail left, one of the competitors, McKelvie, was lying unconscious and in a critical condition, having a broken bone in his neck, besides suffering from a severe concussion of the brain and a large scalp wound. Another rider named Peate received a severe injury in the face, which was badly lacerated, and it is feared that he will be disqualified for life. Vogt's style of riding is generally censured, and it is expected that the occurrence will form the subject of inquiry by the Scottish executive. Only two of the competitors finished first, J. McLaren, East Stirlingshire, being first, and J. Kilgus, Forfarshire, second.

NO TROUBLE TO RIDE A SAFETY.

LONDON WINS.

TORONTO, Aug. 10.—The London Asylum cricket team played a fine game with the Rosedale Club to-day. Rosedale were first to bat, and in the first inning made 83 runs, to which Lyon contributed 51 and Montgomery 14.

London Asylum followed with 182, to which Rev. Mr. Terry contributed 54, England 37 (not out), and Pope 35. A remarkable feature of England's scoring was there was not a single made, the total consisting of 7 fours, 2 threes and 1 five. Rosedale made 105 in the second inning, leaving the visitors but seven to make to win.
