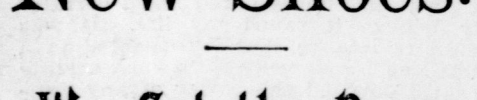

SOOTHING THE EAGLE.

The British Minister at Washington in

a New Role.
Washington, April 8.—It is noted that
never before have the relations be-
tween the British ambassador and the
State Department at Washington been
more friendly than now.

Sir Julian Pauncefote has at last
established with Secretary Olney the
pleasant social relations which char-
acterized his dealings with the late
Secretary Grosvenor. This was not the
case for the first few weeks after Sir
Julian's return from Great Britain last
fall, when Secretary Olney was chafing
under the delay in Lord Salisbury's
reply to the Venezuelan note.

It was not until the middle of Janu-
ary that the modified expressions of
British goodwill paved the way for
Sir Julian's efforts towards his estab-
lishment in Secretary Olney's good
graces. It is understood that Sir
Julian Pauncefote has made himself
very useful to Secretary Olney by giv-
ing him an inside glimpse at continen-
tal diplomacy, with which Sir
Julian is thoroughly familiar.

ONE MORE DEATH

Results from the Ridgeway Disaster—
Inquest Egan.

Ridgeway, April 8.—An inquest to
ascertain the cause of the explosion at Wat-
son Bros.' mill on Monday morning is being
conducted by Coroner Dr. R. C. Young and
a jury.

J. T. Buller, another victim, died at 7
o'clock yesterday morning making three
deaths, and there is likely to be another
death.

The damage will not be less than \$5,000,
though it will quite probably run consid-
erably over that.

BERNHARDT TONIGHT.

To see Madame Sarah Bernhardt to-
night in Sardou's great and thrilling
drama, "La Tosca," at the Grand
Opera House, will be the event of a
life-time to those who will tax the

capacity of the house. So enrapt in
the spell of enthusiasm that is Sarah
is said to invariably weep about her
hearers will be all, that even those
who have to accept standing room,
after the seats are all taken, will some-
away unconscious of any fact, but
filled with new impressions of what
heights in stage art a truly great
artistic—the greatest—the world has
possessed—can scale. Greatness is a fan-
gous word in these times, when it
may either mean everything or noth-
ing, but it is neither rash nor ill-con-
sidered to say that Madame Bern-
hardt's interpretation of "La Tosca"
couches the heights. The detail of her
work is astounding in its perfection.
In the first act her best moment is the
sudden manifestation of jealousy of
the blue-eyed Madeline her lover is
painting. The demand that he shall
paint her eyes black is put in such a
charmingly feminine way that amusing
and approving laughter is always in-
voked. The scenes, however, which
most impress the spectators are those
of the third act, after it has dawned
upon La Tosca's mind that the police
officials are torturing her lover in the
adjoining room in order to extort his
secret. The terrible struggle in her
mind, the hesitation as to whether
she should stop the torture by sacrific-
ing the fugitive's life, is depicted
with a realism that is almost ter-
rific. A marvelous bit of acting,
too, is the scene where, after ac-
cepting Scarpia's terms, she sits down
at the table and guilts a glass of water,
when suddenly her eyes light on the
knife. The whole plan of assassina-
tion, as it suddenly comes upon her,
is read in her eyes as eloquently as if
she spoke it in words. Mr. John B.
