Her Majesty's Massage to the Troops on Parade Received With Great Enthusiasm.

CAPTURE OF FORT LUNDI-KOTAL. London, Aug. 26.-The governor-general of India, the Earl of Elgin, has telegraphed to the government here confirming the news of the capture of Salisbury's Latest Proposal Re-Fort Lundi-Kotal, adding that one native officer was killed and one wounded. The governor-general announces that nearly all the garrison of Fort Two Alei-Musjid has reached Jamrud. The soldiers succeeded in retreating with their arms. The foregoing dispatches have caused a feeling of relief here as they disprove the reported massacre of Notable Performance of "As You Like the garrison of Ali-Musjid, and indicate that the garrison of Lundi-Kotal

has not suffered greatly. Peshawur, Aug. 26.—The only particulars obtainable at present regarding the capture of Fort Lundi-Kotal that the place held out for 24 hours, when the attacking force succeeded in effecting an entrance into the fort. A desperate hand-to-hand fight followed, lasting two hours. It is not known how many of the garrison were killed. The report adds that the enemy is now scattered, but intend to reassemble in September. The British authorities are gratified at the fact that all the men on leave from the Fortieth Regiment of Pathans, composed of Mohammadans, Swatis Bonerwals, whose tribes are revolting, rejoined their colors on the outbreak of the disturbance. In addition, many members of the reserve forces of this pody of men have voluntarily applied for enrollment.

THE KHYBER PASS. Peshawar, Aug. 27.—By the capture of Fort Lundi-Kotal, the famous Khyber Pass, leading from Afghanistan into

nsurgent tribesmen. Khyber Pass is the only highway upon the land opening from Western Asia into the great empire over which Victoria rules. This outlet in the heart of the mountains is called the Gate of India. It has been long said that if the British steamer Coro Coro, from College via Velparaise, for New York, sult will be wrought out in this pass.
The pass will be guarded by several forts, one of which, Fort Mande has forts, one of which, Fort Maude, has already been destroyed by the Afridis. Another, Ali-Musjid, was later burned. Now word comes that Fort Lundi-Kotal -at the extreme end-has also fallen before the Afridis.

Khyber Pass is truly the gate to Inoad over which artillery can cross the great wall of mountains between and is about 30 miles long. It opens! on the east in the extreme northwest-ern portion of India, about 300 miles from the northern town of Simla.
