The Situation In the Far East

British Make Preparations for Further Hostilities.

Permanent Telegraph Line Between Tien Tsin and Peking Being Built—Reiteration of the Statement That the Dowager Empress Intended a General Massacre of Foreigners.

London, Sept. 17.—Dr. Morrison, the Peking correspondent of the Times, in the course of a long dispatch, dated Sept. 5, continues to protest against the evacuation of the capital, but he agrees with the Peking correspondent of the Morning Post that the withdrawal of the Russian troops, owing to their barbarous habits, would be an unmixed benefit. He asserts that further convincing proofs have been obtained of the intention of the dowager to massacre all foreigners. Prince Ching, he says, fails to realize the real situation, evidently being convinced that all the powers can be squared by the payment of a money indemnity.

TUAN THE TOOL.
Baroness Von Ketteler leaves for Germany, via America, tomorrow, cables the New York Herald's correspondent at Peking, under date of Sept. 15. The murder of her husband on June 19 by government soldiers in the main street, prevented a general massacre of all foreigners in Peking, as all the foreign ministers, except Baron Von Ketteler, had decided to accept a Chinese assurance of protection for their journey to Tien Tsin. It is now known that Prince Tuan had arranged for their annihilation en route.

MORE BRITISH TROOPS.
London, Monday, Sept. 17.—A. m.—In connection with the prediction by Sir Robert Hart that there will be further hostilities in November, it is understood that the British government is already considering the transfer of troops from South Africa to India, in order to make it practicable to send more British troops to China.

It is probable that the Russian legation has already been removed from Peking to Tien Tsin, but there is no definite news as yet as to whether Li Hung Chang will after all go to Peking. Gen. Doward is going to the capital, leaving the British troops at Tien Tsin under the command of Brigadier-General Horne Campbell.

The Americans have begun at Hsiao Wu a permanent telegraph line between Peking and Tien Tsin.

The Peking correspondent of the Daily News says that the assassin of Baron Von Ketteler has been shot.

The Morning Post's representative says that the question is being discussed of sending a few British, French and American missionaries who are besieged in a city 200 miles south of Peking.

BOXERS BUSY.

Peking, Sept. 10, via Shanghai, Sept. 15.—A squadron of the Sixth Cavalry will leave here tomorrow to relieve a native Chinese village which was attacked by Boxers 46 miles southeast of Peking. Matson killed many Boxers yesterday. Civilians going to Tien Tsin are warned not to travel without a military escort.

The Russians have received word of reverses in Manchuria, where 200 miles of railway has been destroyed and a number of stations have been burned. There has been much fighting and many Russians have been killed. Three regiments have left Peking on their way to Manchuria.

A gradual reduction of the Russian forces in Peking has begun. Five regiments have already been withdrawn. The number of the Russian force is now about 70,000, of which number 25,000 are Japanese. Baron Nishii, the Japanese minister, favors the withdrawal of 15,000 troops, to be held in reserve in Japan.

It is announced that, owing to the impossibility of getting the railroad through before the winter sets in, the Russian forces will make Tien Tsin their headquarters.

SAVED BY BENGAL LANCERS.

A Tien Tsin dispatch of the 14th says: "A British signal officer reports a sharp engagement between a company of the 14th United States Infantry and 2,000 Boxers at Mo Tao (Ma Tow) on the road to Peking. The Americans made a gallant stand and a detachment of Bengal Lancers near by, hearing the firing, came to their rescue, and charged the Boxers in the rear. The Chinese were routed, leaving 200 dead. The Americans had no casualties. The Germans report an engagement with a heavy force of Boxers west of Peking yesterday (Thursday). The German loss is said to have been 20."

The same dispatch says: "The British have issued an order prohibiting within the limits of the British concession. The Germans are pouring in to Tien Tsin, and all nationalities are scrambling for buildings. The British battery and 200 Australians have arrived."

The Tu Lu expedition has returned to Tien Tsin. The march back was unopposed, and it is reported that the Boxers have retired in force to a village 30 miles up the Grand Canal.

Twelve thousand Germans have arrived at Tien Tsin.

IN MANCHURIA.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 15.—Official dispatches received here announce the capture of Fuliarda on Sept. 8, giving the Russians command of the Manchurian Railway. Gen. Orloff and Gen.

IS DEWET DEAD?

Report That He Was Fatally Wounded at Potchefstroom.

Kruger Has Helped the British by Running Away.

Pretoria, Sept. 16.—There is strong reason to believe that Gen. Dewet, who has caused the British so much trouble, was killed on Sept. 7 near Potchefstroom. His kaffir servant, who has reached Vereeniging, states that Gen. Dewet was shot through the lungs and died a few hours afterwards.

The British captured 42 engines at Barberton. At present, however, they are of no use, as Kaapmuiden, the place where the Barberton road joins the main railway, is still in the hands of the Boers.

KRUGER HELPED THE BRITISH.

London, Sept. 16.—There can be no doubt that Kruger's last step has greatly helped the British. Free and in the Transvaal, he would be a governmental center for exerting a powerful influence over all burghers. Captured, he would have been a source of the greatest embarrassment to his captors. But now, under the protection of the Portuguese government at Lorenzo Marques, it is felt that he is off the stage, powerless both for his friends and against his foes.

KRUGER AS A LECTURER.

London, Monday, Sept. 11.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Vienna says that the manager of the Orpheum will offer ex-President Kruger \$1,000 a week for six weeks to lecture on the war in South Africa.

SMASH-UP ON B. C. RAILWAY

Head-on Collision Between Two Freight Trains.

Engines Crash Together—Robert Fisher, Manager of the Alexandria Mine, One of the Victims.

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 16.—A fatal head-on collision occurred yesterday morning between two freight trains on the Esquimalt and Nanaimo railway, as a result of which four men are dead. The killed are:

Sam Walton, engineer, a native of Toronto, who has been here three years, and who leaves a widow and family in Toronto.

Robert Fisher, superintendent of Alexandria mine, and formerly manager of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company.

Hugh Thompson, fireman.

Henry Saunders, brakeman.

The wreck was caused by a mistake of the operator, who reported the line clear. The trains met on a trestle bridge two miles north of Ladysmith, to which the line inclines from either side. When the engineers saw each other's trains approaching they put on brakes and reversed, but the speed was too great and the trains plunged into each other.

Supt. Fisher tried to jump, but was caught among the wreckage and frightfully mangled. Walton, who died on his engine, was terribly cut up and scalded. The force of the collision was so great that two loaded cars shot clear over the telegraph wires. Both engines were reduced to scrap iron, and the cars were piled on them, making a heap of debris as high as a three-story building.
