Toronto, Jan. 11—11 a. m.—The storm

center has moved from Quebec to the

eastern part of the Gulf, and is causing

strong, very cold, westerly winds in

Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. A

shallow depression, accompanied by snow,

extends from Lake Superior northward to

the Southern States, and an extensive area

of high pressure covers the western part

of the continent. The mild weather continues

in Alberta.
