### CONCLUSION OF LONDON PRESBYTERY.

The Difficulty Between Wardsville Pastor and Members-R. C. McDermid Licensed.

The meeting of the Presbytery of London was brought to a close yesterday afternoon. At the afternoon session a paper was read from the congregation of Newbury, taking exception to the finding of a committee of presbytery which visited Wardsville last May to inquire into difficulties existing between the pastor and some of the members.

Mr. Currie, and agreed, that the presbytery receive the resolution of the congregation of Newbury, express gratification with the state of feeling existing in the Newbury congregation towards their minister, instruct the clerk to inform the congregation that the pastoral tie cannot be dissolved without giving all parties-Newbury included-opportunity to be heard in their interests; and further, that the presbytery resolve to visit the Wardsville and Newbury congregations at a date to be fixed at the September meeting.

### THE HOUSEBOAT

An Eminently English Institution Utilized by Dwellers Along the Connecticut River.

[Springfield Republican.] It used to be a standing wonder to visitors that so beautiful and expansive a river as the Connecticut was turned to so little use by the inhabitants. It is apparent, however, that this reproach is being rapidly removed so far, at least, as the superb reach between Holyoke and Windsor Locks is concerned. The most inveterate landlubber can hardly fail to have noticed that our mosquito fleet has grown to formidable proportions during the last few seasons. It is not so long since the Mascot and a few rowboats and canoes summed up the Springfield flotilla. Now sailboats and yachts dot the water, steam launches puff chipperly about, canoes, rowboats and single shells are multitudinous, and on almost every pleasant evening a very respectable exhibit of eight-oared boats is to be seen. The public, too, has discovered that something is going on at the river, and the shores and bridges are becoming popular warm-weather resorts. When the proposed riverside park is an accomplished fact, and the public has untammeled access to the more beautiful part of the banks, it will at last be appreciated that the Connecticut deserves better treatment than it has

had in the past. It is rather odd, however, that people of moderate means, who are in a state of chronic uncertainty as to their plans for a summer vacation, have never taken up that eminently English institution, the houseboat. Every one is familiar with it through the medium of British fiction, and in other parts of the country it has been acclimated with conspicuous success. The Florida coast and inland waters, for example, are lined with the houseboats of northern millionaires. As for England, society would hardly know what to do without its houseboats on the Thames, which are almost as indispensable as the London house or the

box in the country. But in New England the idea has not yet taken root, though the wandering artists who drift about the coast and rivers in floating studios may help to set a fashion which is worthy of imitation. The beauty of a houseboat is that it offers the comforts of home together with the variety of travel. One may be cut off absolutely from the world and yet near enough to home to get to business by a morning train. The houseboat offers a delightful change for the vacation season, with the minimum of wear and tear, and the time may come when scores of Rudder Granges will dot the clear waters of

the Connecticut.

Perhaps the chief charm in this sort of floating houses is perfect freedom, with none of the danger and discomfort of yachting, there is the gratification of the love for the water which exists in the normal human mind.

There is a satisfaction even in the bare feeling of being affoat which takes the oldest back to the days of childhood. On the smooth waters of the river there is peace, quiet, coolness and variety. When one is tired of looking at one lovely prospect, up anchor, and the current soon brings fresh scenes in view. One gets for nothing a homestead of inexhaustible dimensions, with the chance of catching a breakfast of fresh fish in the front yard. One is spared the annoyance of the summer hotel, and the worry and weariness of travel. The houseboat is a bit of floating home, made the more cosy and homelike by its

There are those who have a prejudice against rivers as the seat of fogs and malarial fevers, but so large a proportion of the population of the earth has from time immemorial lived a riparian life without evil consequences that the objection cannot be so formidable as it seems. Certainly the English are not frightened away from the Thames by the mere fact that it is a river. And now that the scientists have laid the full responsibility for malaria upon the mosquito, and relieved the atmosphere from all blame, perhaps it will be possible to enjoy the fresh coolness of the water again without disturbing thoughts of chills and fever. A more practical objection is the difficulty of caring for such a boat during the winter, but now that the river is coming into such general use it will probably not be long before a satisfactory way is found for caring for the large craft, including the yachts and steam launches. The initial cost of a plain but substantial houseboat of two stories need not be great, and once built it can be counted on to last for many years.
