ON THE JORDAN!

Great Fields of Mineral Wealth Discovered
Both Sides of the Noted River.

Washington, Aug. 8.-The department of state has received from Ernest L. Hart's, consular agent at Eibstock, a report on the mineral treasures of Palestine. The report says: "The newly discovered mineral deposits lie on both sides of the Jordan and the Dead Sea. The salt deposits of the Dead Sea could be developed into an industry. The most important of all the deposits is phosphate. At present the phosphate mines of Florida almost supply the world's demand. The immense fields of phosphate to the east and west of the Jordan need only better means of traffic and communication in order to insure development. This, it would seem, is not far distant, as the Turkish Government is planning a continuation of the Yafat-Jerusalem Railroad and steamboats are already plying the Dead Sea."

AN ALLEGED
SPY ARRESTED!

Berlin Newspaper Correspondent To Be
Court-Martialed and May Be Shot.

More Cape Traitors Sent to Jail--Four British Columns
Operating for Weeks Against Viljeon Boers
Lost Heavily.

Berlin, Aug. 7.-The Tageblatt announces that its correspondent, Herr Meibach, who was with the Boers, has been arrested as a spy by the British, and that he will be tried by court martial at Middleburg.

MORE REBELS ARRESTED.

Cape Town, Aug. 7.-Small parties of Boers are hovering about the Dordrecht district. The British troops are harassing them. Seven farmers have been placed in jail at Dordrecht on the charge of assisting the invaders.

CANADIAN LOSES HIS EYE.

Ottawa, Aug. 7.-The following telegram from the secretary of state for the colonies to Lord Minto was received at the militia department today:

"London, Aug. 6.-Please inform S. A. Walker, Brandon, Manitoba, that his son, William John Adams Walker, South African Constabulary, has been accidentally wounded at Petrusburg, on July 31. Eye removed.

(Signed), CHAMBERLAIN."

OPERATIONS AGAINST VILJEON.

London, Aug. 7.-On July 20 Lord Kitchener reported that Gen. F. W. Kitchener had captured a pom-pom and several wagons and prisoners from Commandant Viljeon after a long pursuit.

\$25,000 REWARD

Offered For the Arrest and Conviction of the Selby Gold Thieves-A Suspect in Custody.

San Francisco, Aug. 8.-The police have now in custody a man known as "Buck" Taylor, who is suspected of complicity in the robbery of the Selby smelting works. The Selby Smelting Company has increased the reward from \$5,000 to \$25,000. This reward will be paid for the arrest and conviction of the criminals, and for the return of the gold. The company places its exact loss at \$125,000.

DISASTER IN
IRISH CHANNEL

White Star Liner Oceanic Runs
Down the Kincora.

Seven of the Coaster's Crew Drowned
and Seven Rescued-Collision Occurred During a Fog.

Queenstown, Aug. 8.-The White Star line steamer Oceanic, Capt. Cameron, which sailed from Liverpool yesterday, for New York, via Queenstown, arrived here this morning, and reported having been in collision last night, in the Irish channel, with the steamer Kincora, of Waterford, Ireland.

The Kincora sank and seven persons were drowned.

The Kintora was a steel screw steamer of 453 tons. She belonged to the Waterford Steamship Company. The collision occurred in a fog.

The bow of the Oceanic was damaged.

The Kincora was a coasting vessel trading between Waterford and Limerick. She had a crew of 14 men. The Oceanic brought the seven survivors to this port.

VISIT OF DUKE
AND DUCHESS!

Interesting Instructions Issued
From Headquarters at
Ottawa.

London Among the Centers at Which
Addresses May Be Presented-
Brevity and Conciseness
Imperative.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Ottawa, Aug. 8.-The following announcement has been handed out from Government House in regard to the visit of their royal highnesses to Canada:

"Instructions as to presentation of addresses:

"Addresses may be presented at the following centers: Quebec, Montreal (for Montreal addresses only), Ottawa, Winnipeg, Regina, Vancouver, Victoria, Toronto, London (for London addresses only), Hamilton (for Hamilton addresses only), Kingston, St. John and Halifax.

Addresses from cities or towns not mentioned in the list should be presented at the centers nearest to such city or town.

Addresses should be short and worded as concisely as possible.

Drafts of addresses for presentation to His Royal Highness should reach the governor-general's secretary at the citadel, Quebec, by the first of September, for his excellency's approval. It should be stated at what center it is proposed to present them.

The deputation intending to present the address should be limited to four individuals, and the names of the proposed deputation should in every case accompany the draft address.

WILL DISTRIBUTE DECORATIONS.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.-It has been arranged that the Duke of Cornwall and York will present the Victoria Cross decorations that have been won by Canadians in South Africa. There are three in all-Cockburn, in Toronto; Turner, in Quebec; and Holland, in Ottawa. Richardson, of the Northwest got his from the King in London.

STILL GRABBING.

New York, Aug. 8.-It is announced here that the United States Steel Corporation has obtained control of the Selby tube works, a corporation with fifteen mills in various parts of the country, producing tubes of all kinds. The weekly product of the combined mills is about 5,000 tons of tubes.

SUDDEN DEATH OF AN ARTIST.

Boulder, Col., Aug. 8.-Charles H. Cox, a landscape painter and teacher of water color painting at the Chautauqua, fell dead yesterday in the State University. Mr. Cox came here from the Thousand Islands, Canada, but is a resident of Waco, Texas. He had been a teacher on the grounds every season of the Chautauqua. He was 70 years of age.
