Discomfort From His Wound. PROCEEDINGS WERE PRIVATE London, June 29 .- The following

bulletin regarding the condition of King Edward was issued at Bucking Patrick McHugh, M.P., To Be ham Pauace at 9 o'clock this morning: 9 a.m.-The King feels stronger, spite of some discomfort from the wound. Nothing has occurred to dis-turb the satisfactory progress the King is making. (Signed) Treves, London, June 30 .- The colonial con-

ingham Palace at 4 o'clock this afternoon said the King's progress was in every way satisfactory, and that the 9:40 p.m.-King Edward's physicians announced at twenty minutes of ten tonight that the royal patient's progress was entirely satisfactory.

Sunday was a day of intercessional services for the recovery of King Edward throughout the kingdom. In the morning a vast crowd of the general public gathered at St. Paul's Cathedral. Besides these there were present a representative gathering of government and colonial officials and uniformed colonial officers. Fell to the Depth of Eight Inches-Colorado Drought Broken.


Denver, June 29. - The drought which threatened to be the most severe that Colorado has known for years, has been broken by a rain as general in extent as it was copious in quantity. Though the storm in places was accompanied by hail, which did much damage, this is trivial compared with the value of the crops saved by the rain.

The storm damage in Denver and vicinity is estimated all the way from \$10,000 to \$50,000. Snow fell to the depth of eight inches in Leadville and many other places in the mountains. Chattanooga, Tenn., June 29.-Three persons were killed in last night's storm and much damage was done to farms in this section.

Miss Cora Kelly, a school teacher, of this city, was killed by a falling tree James Grayson, near Dayton, Tenn. proprietor of a sawmill, and his sawyer, Jesse May, were killed by falling timbers.

During a thunderstorm at Harriman, Tenn., today, a 15-year-old daughter of Frank Dugger, was killed by lightning. Mr. Dugger's residence was burned to the ground, and a second daughter was seriously injured.
