Trees and Treasures.

Time changes all things, and time is changing the public and private esti-mate of trees in this country. When the pioneers came upon a vast wilderness the trees were as much opposed to their making comfortable livelihoods as were the copper-skinned sav-ages. They made war upon the forest with more zeal than judgment; they slaughtered and laid waste, says the Pittsburg Post. With such beginnings of the people their constituted authorities have been slow to make laws for the protection of mere trees, though gradually the worth of the latter has come to be understood by many: Old trees soon will be held, as they should be, to be sacred, and young trees as something to be encouraged, fostered and trained in the way they should go. It is only a few years since Dr. Marill, of this state, astonished the public by bringing suit against a telephone company for hacking branches off some trees because they interfered with the stringing or proper insulation of its wires. The courts sustained the doctor's contention that ancient trees are treasures. The telephone company will not soon forget the fact, for it was compelled to pay smartly for the destruction wrought.

An article in the Pall Mall Gazette on the Simplon tunnel suggests speculation on the great tunnels still to be made. One which involves great engineering difficulties was lately sanctioned by the Austrian Parliament. It will pierce the Alps between the Vorarlberg and Trieste, and with its approaches will cost not less than £7,000,000 (\$35,000,000). Another project of greater importance, though it has not yet got further than being talked about, is for a tunnel under the Grimsel Pass. This, indeed, may be regarded as the inevitable supplement to the Simplon, which it will couple with the Bernese Oberland, enabling travel almost in a bee line from Colais to Milan. It is bound to come, therefore, in due course, but it will probably be the last big tunnel in our days. to edit the New England Review. During his brief stay in that city, lasting less than two years, he became acquainted with Judge Russ, one of the ablest and most influential citizens of the town. His youngest child, Cornelia, was a strikingly beautiful girl, about seventeen years old, when the young poet met her and fell desperately in love. Why she did not reciprocate we do not know, but it is not difficult to conjecture. About to leave Hartford, he wrote to her an offer of marriage. This letter is deeply interesting, not only because it finally settles the question of Whittier's only romance, but for another even more important reason. The youthful literary aspirant, aged twenty-four, who had published at this time only one volume of poems, suppress, and with only a small local reputation, distinctly prophesies his months after Wh future renown — a prophecy fulfilled poem 'Memories.' beyond his furthest aspirations. Through the kindness of Mr. Charles C. Russ, a grandnephew of Cornelia, I am now able to print this highly interesting document for the first time:

"There are several interesting points to be noted in this love-letter: Whittier did not use the Quaker pronouns, his almost invariable custom, thinking, perhaps, the plural was more respectful.
