### The Beef Trust.

The beef trust has given another lift to meat prices in the United States, and a howl has gone up from one end of the country to the other. In New York the retail price of sirloin steak has advanced to 24 cents per pound, porterhouse steak to 28 cents, prime ribs of beef to 24 cents, pork to 17 cents and mutton to 16 cents. These increases have come right on top of the judgment of the United States Supreme Court, declaring the packers' combine to be in violation of the anti-trust laws. They have come at the very moment that the federal authorities are investigating the trust's methods, and taking criminal proceedings against it in the courts of Illinois. The other day federal officers seized six trunks of books believed to contain records of trust transactions. Eight heads of departments in the big packing concerns who were wanted to give evidence before the federal grand jury disappeared and could not be served with subpoenas. They have been traced to this country, where they are said to be living at the best hotels. The grand jury has handed down several indictments and arrests are likely to follow if the persons
