One Solitary Load of Straw at \$7.50 Per Ton—Weekly Review.

LOCAL MARKET.
London, Wednesday, April 8.
There was not much offered at the market today.

One load of straw sold at \$7.50 per ton.

There was no hay, oats or in fact any other farm products offered.

WEEKLY REVIEW.

Hay and Straw—There was a much brisker demand for hay the past week than was the case the previous week; those who have been predicting that we would have a dry crop in the spring are not considered good prophets, as from the present outlook there are no indications that prices will reach the low level mentioned for some time to come; there is, however, a large quantity of hay to be marketed, and it is generally considered that there will be a decline in prices before the new crop is placed on the market; sales are made at present at \$12 to \$14 per ton for clover hay, and \$14 to \$15 for timothy. Straw is selling mostly at \$7.50 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—Contrary to expectations the price of butter continues to be high, and the demand is brisk at \$2 to \$2.50 for choice crocks and \$1.50 for poorer rolls; for store lots 2c to 2.50c. Eggs are firmer than a week ago; sales are made mostly at 15c and 16c per dozen for crate and basket.

Potatoes—The demand is not quite as brisk as was the case a week or so ago; prices are fairly well maintained, at 9c to \$1 per bag for wholesale.

Apples—Prices are a trifle high for the best grades; good Spies sell at \$2 per barrel, and one lot of extra choice sold at Tuesday's market at \$2.25 per barrel; for inferior stock \$1.25 to \$1.50 per barrel.

Poultry—The demand for turkeys is brisk, at 15c to 16c per lb. alive, and 10c to 12c for dressed; chickens, 10c to 12c per lb. alive and 10c to 12c for dressed; old fowl, 10c to 12c per lb. alive, and 10c to 12c for dressed; the dealers expect that prices will hold firm until after Easter.

Dressed Hogs—Prices are higher, and the demand is good for this time of the year; sales are made at present at \$8.25 per cwt.

Live Hogs—The price paid here last Monday was \$6 per cwt; as the market is strong, there is an advance in prices for next Monday's shipment; small pigs are higher, at \$5 to \$6 per pair for pigs 6 to 8 weeks old.

Hides—There is no change in the prices of hides, which sell at 4c per lb. for No. 1, 3c for No. 2, and 2c for No. 3 grades; calfskins sell at 8c per lb. and sheepskins at 25c to \$1 per skin.

Wool—Unless there is a change in the situation, wool will likely sell lower this season than last year.

Maple Syrup—Trade in this line is fair; sales are made at \$1.10 and \$1.15 per gallon wholesale.

PRODUCE MARKET.

TORONTO.

Toronto, April 8.—The export situation continues to interfere with business locally. The beginning of export orders would soon clear out local stocks, and then an advance might be expected. A good deal of the Canadian trade in oats with the West Indies is being captured by the Argentine. A large Peterborough cereal concern is reported to have taken 300,000 bu. of Argentine oats. Prices are:

Cheese.—The demand has been moderate, the influence of the free arrivals and stocks of New Zealand in London being reflected in the trade on Canadian. New Zealand has met with fair demand and prices are about 10 per cent dearer. Canadians are about unchanged. Medium grades still continue in slow request. We report the following values as follows: Finest Canadian, colored, 10c to 11c per cwt; do, white, 6c to 8c; earlier-made Canadian, white and colored, 6c to 8c; do, 10c to 12c; New Zealand, white and colored, 8c to 10c; States half-meats, a slow sale, offering at 4c to 5c.

Butter.—The demand has been slow and disappointing, and with a further decline there is now some irregularity in values of choice Danish and colonial. The Copenhagen quotation is called 6 kroner lower for next week. Medium grades are still in very moderate demand, and are offering at a further reduction in values. We quote today: Choice Danish creamery, 10c to 11c; choice Australian and New Zealand, 10c to 11c; choice Irish creamery, none; choice Argentine, 10c to 11c; choice States creamery, none; States process creamery, none; States ladies and imitations, 8c to 9c.
