It will be a matter of some surprise
to our readers to know that, without
premonitory rumblings, a large coal
company, with an influential Canadian
board, and practically complete organi-
zation, has been formed for operation
of mines in Ohio and West Virginia.
The project, which was first
brought up for consideration some three
or four months ago, has been very
quietly investigated and finally under-
taken with Toronto and Montreal in-
terests in control. The unsold part of
\$1,750,000 of bonds is being offered at
par, with bonus of 50 per cent of stock,
by four prominent investment houses,
viz., A. E. Ames & Co., Limited, and
F. H. Deacon & Co., Toronto, and Ro-
dolphe Forget and Johnston, McCon-
nell & Allison, Montreal. Under such
auspices the offering should be suc-
cessful.

The prospectus is very complete, and
our readers are referred to the adver-
tisement in this issue.

The reason indicated for the forma-
tion of such a company is that the
coal consumed in the central provinces
of Canada is so largely obtained from
the neighboring states that Canadian
capital has, to some extent, been in-
terested for years in those fields, and
that it has seemed appropriate that a
strong coal company should be formed
with ample capital under Canadian
control. It is felt that such a com-
pany, through its special connection
with the Canadian trade, could sup-
plement the local buying market in the
states in a way tending to insure the
steadiest possible market for its pro-
duction year in and year out, thereby
securing the greatest economy of oper-
ation. A favorable opportunity hav-
ing, it is said, presented itself, the
Sterling Coal Company, Limited, is be-
ing formed, with the object of acquir-
ing certain mines of bituminous coal
now operating under capacity, and
further equipping them and develop-
ing others, all of these properties be-
ing well selected as to specially ad-

The property consists of three
groups, viz.: The Hileman Group, which
has four operating mines on the Penn-
sylvania and Erie Railroads, situated

Ontario Navigation Company, Mon-
treal; J. W. McConnell, director Pa-
cific Pass Coal Company, Montreal; F.
H. Deacon, of F. H. Deacon & Co.,
Investment Brokers, Toronto; Andrew
Squire, counsel-at-law, Cleveland,
Ohio, and H. D. Hileman, Cleveland,
general manager of the company, who
has been a successful coal mine opera-
tor for some years.

ENGINEERS TO JOIN IN HIGHER WAGE DEMAND

Trainmen Will Today Have
Another Conference With
G. T. R. and C. P. R.
at Montreal.

New York, Jan. 29.—Coincident with
the negotiations now in progress be-
tween the brotherhoods of conductors
and of railway trainmen, and the 32
controlling railroad companies east of
the Mississippi and north of the
Ohio and Chesapeake, it was said here
today that the Grand Lodge of the
Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers
is preparing demands to be made up
on the same roads.

Heretofore, the engineers, which is
one of the strongest and most inde-
pendent unions in the country, has
held aloof from any united labor de-
mands and steadfastly refused to join
the other railway unions in demand
for more pay.

Vice-Presidents Murdoch and Barry
of the Brotherhood of Railroad Train-
men, have arranged conferences to be
held at Montreal on Monday with the
Grand Trunk Railway and Canadian
Pacific Railway to take up finan-
cial action on the question of increased
wages.

EDWARD SENDS HELP TO FLOOD SUFFERERS

King and Queen Contribute Five
Thousand Dollars Each.

London, Jan. 29.—King Edward and
Queen Alexandra today each contrib-
uted \$5,000 to the Mansion House fund

FIRST IN PORCUPINE

Company Organized to Carry on Op-
erations in New Gold Field.

Toronto, Jan. 29.—Notice of the first
company incorporated for the purpose
of carrying on mining operations in
the new Porcupine gold fields, is given
in this week's Ontario Gazette. The
company will be known as the Por-
cupine Consolidated Mining Company,
Limited, Toronto, and is capitalized at
\$40,000, in shares of \$1 each. Other
provincial companies incorporated this
week are the Berlin Shoe Manufac-
turing Company, Berlin, \$40,000; Big
Creek Natural Gas Company, Limited,
Hamilton, \$200,000; Kingston Ship-
building Company, Limited, Kingston,
\$500,000; the Ontario Lorraine Mining
Company, Limited, Toronto, \$1,000,-
000; the Lake Simcoe Ice Supply and
Cold Storage Company, Limited, has
increased its capital stock from \$100,-
000 to \$200,000.

HARVESTER'S DIVIDEND.

Chicago, Jan. 29.—Directors of the
International Harvester Company to-
day declared a stock dividend of 33 1-3
per cent on the common stock to hold-
ers of record on Feb. 3. This came as
the result of the recent increase in
the amount of common stock from

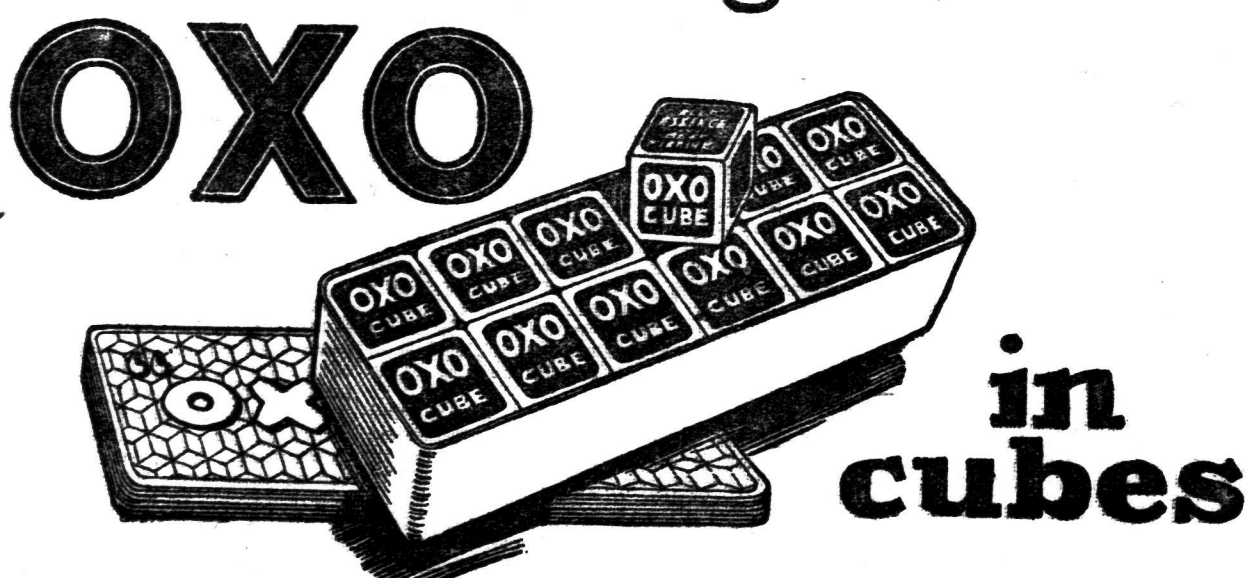

E. ELGIN CONSERVATIVES IN ANNUAL MEETING

Large Gathering at Aylmer Addressed
by Messrs. Brodeur and Marshall.

Aylmer, Jan. 31.—The East Elgin
Conservative Association held its an-
nual meeting here on Saturday, being
well attended.

Officers of the association were
elected as follows: President, Mr. J. P.
Marty, of Yarmouth; vice-president,
Mr. Newton Newell, of Aylmer; secre-
tary-treasurer, Mr. E. A. Miller, of
Aylmer, re-elected.

Mr. Andrew Broder, M. P. for Dun-
das, was the principal speaker. His
address was devoted largely to agri-
cultural matters of the Province. He
declared that the falling off in exports
of Ontario farm produce was a great
mistake, and not due to increased
home consumption. Referring to the
navy he said that he believed that as
far as the country was concerned the
people were not favorable to a Cana-
dian navy. He refused, however, to
say, if he knew, just what stand the
Opposition intended to take when the
matter comes up for debate in the
House.

Mr. David Marshall, the member for
East Elgin, also spoke. He denounced
the Verville eight-hour bill, and, de-
claring for a direct naval contribution,
said he had communicated with all his
constituents, and found the majority
of them were against a Canadian navy.
Mr. Wm. Jackson, of Port Stanley,
ex-M. P. for West Elgin, spoke, very

highly of the ability of the services of
Messrs. Broder and Marshall.

YOUTH CONFESSES TO BRUTAL ATTACK

Assaulted Norwood Ladies With an
Axe in Order to Get Money.

Toronto, Jan. 29.—Supt. J. E. Rogers
of the provincial police force, received
a dispatch this morning from Inspector
Henry Reburn, who was dispatched to
investigate the brutal assault on the
Misses MacPherson at Havelock, stating
Robert Henderson, the English youth un-
der arrest on suspicion, had confessed.
The lad's excuse is that he was unable
to obtain work, and committed the as-
sault to get money. The department has
instructed the local crown authorities to
ask for a week's remand in order to
make further investigations regarding
the antecedents, character and conduct
of the prisoner.

Margaret MacPherson is still alive, but
is not expected to last through the day.
Her sister Susan, aged 65 years, whose
head was cut open by the same weapon,
is not dangerously injured. Henderson
is in custody at Havelock, and will have
his preliminary hearing there today.

FATAL ACCIDENT ON AN ENGLISH RAILWAY

Eight Persons Were Killed and
Twenty Injured When Fast
Express Leaves Rails.

London, Jan. 29.—Eight persons were
killed and twenty others badly injured
when an express train, running between
Brighton and London, was wrecked at
Stout's Nest station this afternoon.
The express train was travelling at the
rate of 40 miles an hour when the loco-
motive left the rails. The two front cars
were flung across the platform, while
the Pullman following them was pitched
into the air and fell on the station. The
remainder of the train was smashed to
pieces.

Almonte, Ont., Jan. 29.—A recount of
the ballot cast at the recent local option
voting here took place before Judge
Sankler, of Perth, on the application of
the liquor party. The recount made no
change in the result.

MUST WEAR BLACK.

Newark, N. J., Jan. 29.—Chief Justice
Gummers, the highest judge of the New
Jersey supreme court, today requested all
of the lawyers who will appear at the
trial of the three sisters charged with
the murder of young Mrs. Oscar W. M.
Snead, to wear black clothing. The three
sisters pleaded not guilty today, and
their trial was set for the first Monday
of the April term. Miss Virginia Ward-
law, Mrs. Caroline E. Martin and Mrs.
Mary Snead are charged in the indict-
ment with the murder of the young wo-
