IRRITATED, WAS MR. WM. C. COO

Told the City Council of London Where They Were At a Meeting Yesterday.

BREEZE OVER A RADIAL

"I'll Feed the Delegates if That's What You're Afraid Of," Mr. Coo Shouted—People's Railway to Interview City.

There was a breeze at the session of the city council last night regarding a meeting with the promoters of the People's Railway of Berlin and Guelph. The incident created quite a bit of excitement.

"I would like to see the council give these men a rousing reception," declared Mr. W. C. Coo, who waited on the city in regard to the matter. "We need radial railways, and I think it would be to our advantage to have the council meet Mr. Bugg, the manager, and discuss the situation."

"I am not interested, except as a citizen," he explained. They wrote to him saying that they would like to meet the council here, and I have brought the matter before you. They will be in the city Friday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock."

Looking for a Bonus.
Ald. Richter, in discussing the matter, stated that the company was, in all probability, looking for a bonus from the municipality and for the citizens to take stock in the road. He also stated that he had visited the neighborhood not long ago, and the railway operates through a township where it has no bylaw giving it the right to do so.

"Do not throw water on the scheme until you hear what it is," suggested Mr. Coo.

"This is a matter for No. 1 committee," said Ald. Saunders. "I move that it be sent to that body."

Some Hot Shot.
"What is the use of that?" shot back Mr. Coo. "You can meet these men at 3:30 all right, and hear their proposition. So far as I know there is no suggestion of bonuses or anything of that kind."

"I will feed the men, if that is what you are afraid of. The expense will not be on you. If you call that sort of conduct boosting the city you can call it that."

With that he turned on his heel and went out.

"There is no need for any person to talk like that," his worship retorted, but Mr. Coo had gone.

Later it was decided that as many of the aldermen as possibly could should meet the representatives of the People's Railway this afternoon.

A GLEAM OF HOPE FOR PLUCKED STUDENTS

Certain Candidates Who Wrote on High School Exams. May Be Allowed to Pass.

A dispatch to the Advertiser from Toronto states that the Minister of Education has authorized Boards of Examiners to grant at their discretion for the present year, a pass standing to candidates who made less than 40 per cent of the marks in any one subject, but who obtained 60 per cent on the aggregate.

Inspector Edwards stated that he had not been notified of the above rule as yet, but thought that if it had been issued it would apply to those who wrote on the high school entrance examinations.

DECLARES HAYS DIDN'T REFUSE TO ARBITRATE

Did Not Reject Positively as Reported, Says Strike Leader Garrelson.

Toronto, July 28.—That statement in one of the morning papers that Mr. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk, had positively refused to arbitrate at the conference he had with him yesterday in Montreal, is incorrect, said President Garrelson, of the Order of Railway Conductors, this morning, when interviewed in the King Edward Hotel.

"What Mr. Hays did say was that he would talk the matter over with Vice-President Fitzhugh, of the Grand Trunk, today, and communicate with us later. Both President Lee and myself told him that he could catch us at the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, any time today."

"Do you think Mr. Hays will consent to arbitrate," asked the reporter. "He could not say that I rather think he will, as there is great pressure being brought to bear on him by outside forces," was the answer.

Mission of Peace.

Then Messrs. Garrelson and Lee gave a full recital of what took place at the conference yesterday. "We went to Mr. Hays and told him that we had heard that there were reports around that our mission in Canada was one of war, which we assured him was false, and asserted that we were on an errand of peace if it could be secured with honor. We said we heartily indorsed the action of Vice-Presidents Berry and Murdoch in acceding to the request of the minister of labor to have an impartial board of arbitration appointed to settle the trouble."

Message to King.

"We then showed the following message we had sent to Mr. King. "After careful discussion and full realization of the existing conditions on the Grand Trunk, the fact that is brought into most prominence is, if both sides persist in the determination to fight it out to a finish, that communities, industries and the public, who are wholly dependent on the Grand Trunk service, must continue to suffer both loss and hardship thereby. "Both sides should give consideration to the interests of those who suffer from the effects of the strike, and we fully approve and indorse the action of the public, who are wholly dependent on the Grand Trunk service, and their treatment to any impartial tribunal that can be mutually agreed upon. "Should this be declined by the other."

principal, the burden of the responsibility for the public injury must of necessity, lie upon those who refuse.

Impartial Board O. K.
"We explained that we were ready to accept an impartial tribunal to deal with the matters between the parties."

"There was no mention then of the nationality of the arbitrators?" asked the reporter of Mr. Garrelson.

"Not at all. We don't care a hang for nationality; our organization has none. All we ask is that the representatives be men."

The Other Way.
"Hays then wanted to know if all other means of a settlement were closed, to which we replied that he could open up communication with the men through Messrs. Berry and Murdoch and try to arrange a settlement that way. He, however, would not consent to such a course."

"We offered to go into conference with him and agree on some plan of arbitration. He then explained that he had offered to apply the standard rates in 1913."

"Can you afford to do less now than at that time?" we asked him, and "Can we discuss that question and arrive at a settlement?"

"He did neither agree to nor refuse to agree to such a course. He raised the question as to how our men would return to the service. We told him that their return must be based on all of the men returning to their old positions, with the exception of those who had been acts of violence, whom we would not defend in the least."

"We have already heard that some of our members are in jail," said Mr. Hays.

"That may be," we answered, "but still that does not say that they are guilty of committing any act of violence, and we shall regard them as innocent until the law says they are guilty, and then we shall have nothing more to do with them."

He retained his uncompromising attitude in the fight, we clearly gave him to understand that it would be a fight to a finish, and that the burden of hardship forced upon the public would not be our fault when he had refused a pacific proposition.



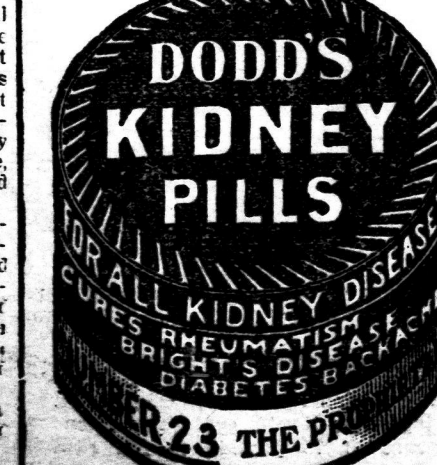
Springbank Theatre.

Since President Cleveland's time the cost of the Government of the United States has gone up from \$1,136,000,000 in four years to \$1,926,000,000 in one year.

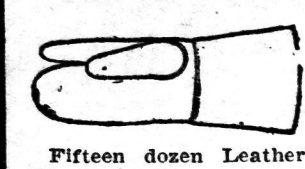

The proposed international exhibition at Bilbao, Spain, in 1912, is now practically a certainty. It is to cost \$1,380,000.

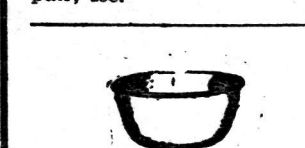
