EDITOR MACDONALD ON WITNESS STAND

Defendant in Libel Case Proves Excellent Witness Under Long Examination.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, Feb. 22.—Dr. J. A. Macdonald, editor of the Globe, and the defendant in the case, was the first witness called this morning in the Foster-Macdonald libel suit and proved, as was expected, the most interesting witness so far examined. A crack for the plaintiff was given early in the morning. It will be remembered that in his address to the jury, outlining the case for Mr. Foster, Mr. Hellmuth said he understood the defence would admit certain statements had been made, and plead absence of criminal intent, though when the statements had been made the Globe had defied Mr. Foster and challenged him to bring on a libel suit. It did not take Mr. Macdonald long to show, by direct evidence, that the statements on which the charge was based were not the statements which plaintiff in the present case alleged to be libellous.

PHILADELPHIA'S TURMOIL CAUSES MORE DEATHS

Two Men Killed Tuesday as a Result of the Strike Riots.

Philadelphia, Feb. 22.—As a retaliatory measure for the arrest of National Organizer C. O. Pratt, of the Carpenters' Union, President John J. Murphy, of the Central Labor Union, which claims a membership of 100,000 persons, has communicated with the presidents of all local trades unions affiliated with the central body, asking them the advisability of calling a general strike in sympathy with the street car men. Mr. Murphy early in the day stated that a general strike had been ordered, but he modified this later when he announced that the proposition for a general conflict had been referred to the various unions.

The central labor union last Sunday gave the executive committee authority to call a general strike, and whether such should be called. Mr. Murphy said, rests with the individual unions. Among the scenes passed over in Philadelphia at the city hall C. O. Pratt was given a hearing in the central police station today and held in \$3,000 bail. He was charged with inciting to riot and conspiracy, the bail on each count being \$1,000.

FEAR HALLEY'S COMET

Foreigners at Winnipeg Believe That Life Will Be Snuffed Out.

Winnipeg, Feb. 22.—The foreigners of Winnipeg are terror-stricken over the approach of Halley's comet. It is said to be the current belief among the ignorant people that when Halley's comet passes over Winnipeg on May 19 all life will be snuffed out. The clergy working among them have tried to allay their fears, but with little success.

BURNING JET IGNITED.

Hamilton, Feb. 22.—About 50 children in the school room of the First Congregational Church Sunday school and a narrow escape about 8 o'clock this evening, when there was an explosion of gas in an adjoining room.

The glass in the communicating passage was blown to pieces, while the doors leading to the street were knocked off their hinges. The gas escaped from a pipe and ignited from a burning jet.

TREATY OF PEACE HAS BEEN SIGNED

Engineer Sifton Surrenders With Honors of War to Engineer Glaubitz.

MAY KEEP HIS SWORD

Acquits Niagara Power Engineer of Wrongful Intentions, But Inserts Clause Which Covers His Own Retreat.

The controversy between Mr. H. J. Glaubitz, consulting engineer, and Mr. E. I. Sifton, of this city, over the authorship of the changes at Springbank pumping station is at an end apparently.

Yesterday afternoon, the gentlemen were brought together, and after a spirited conference, a statement was drawn up that cleared away all cause of friction.

The cause of the trouble was due to a story in a local paper, credited to Mr. Glaubitz, in which he advocated certain changes in the Springbank equipment. Mr. Sifton resented the imputation that he had not recommended the changes prior to Mr. Glaubitz's visit, and accepting the interview as true, he made some sharp comments on Mr. Glaubitz's actions.

The explanation. At the meeting of the water commissioners Saturday, he expressed his opinions as reported accurately in The Advertiser, which in turn were resented by Mr. Glaubitz, as being unjust to him.

The latter demanded an explanation, and as a result of the conference reported yesterday in The Advertiser, both parties appear satisfied with the outcome.

Wants Britain To Build Fleet and Canada To Pay For It.

Montreal, Feb. 22.—Following up its denunciation of the naval policies of the Government and Opposition, which Star today outlines a policy as follows:

"We believe that Canada should undertake the construction and maintenance of such an addition to the naval forces of the empire as shall satisfy our honor and come within our means."

"We believe it is essential that the ships we decide to build shall be constructed as rapidly and efficiently as possible against the hour of danger to the empire, which far more skilled observers than some of our own placid parliamentarians feel is imminent."

"We believe that Canadian officers and Canadian sailors should be trained in the naval lore and under the discipline of the finest navy in the world."

Canada's Navy.

"We believe that Canada should enter into an arrangement with the British admiralty by virtue of which our addition to the navy of the empire shall be ours in the fullest meaning of the word, yet one that will per-
