Six-Team League for  
Canadian Next Year

Frank Shaughnessy Says Guelph and Berlin Should  
Be Dropped and Other Six Clubs Would  
Form Compact Circuit.



OTTAWA, Nov. 19.—If the Ottawa Club has its way there will be a six-team circuit in the Canadian League for next season. Manager Frank Shaughnessy stated yesterday that such a series embracing Ottawa, Hamilton, St. Thomas, Brantford and Peterborough would just be his ideal. He likes the idea of Erie and other towns in New York state, but doubts if they will be ready in time. Erie has been given until Jan. 1 in which to organize, and the Canadian League's composition will not be known until after that date. "Shag," thinks that St. Thomas, Brantford and Peterborough can be developed into first-class ball towns, and is also of the opinion that it would be a good move to drop both Guelph and Berlin. The question will be threshed out at the annual meeting, which is to be held next month at Toronto. With a six-team circuit, as suggested by the Ottawa, the clubs would probably be far better off. It would mean additional visits to the capital of the strong teams like London and Hamilton, and the others could also strengthen. It would be a better financial proposition as well, as Guelph and Berlin have not only been poor drawing cards on the road but they seldom draw crowds of any proportions when at home. St. Thomas and Brantford, with good teams, would do exceptionally well, and Peterborough has already shown its qualifications for a permanent berth in the league. Peterborough really had the best-balanced club in the league last year, and with proper management they would have won the pennant. They had a first-class pitching staff and some of the hardest hitters in the Canadian. Next year Peterborough will certainly be heard from.

Walter Fair, the good cover of last year's Ottawa Juniors, and who played on the Junior All-Star team last winter, has since joined the ranks of the beneficiaries. Fair is over age this year, and will play with the Intermediates, who expect to put a formidable seven on the ice.

Ernie Johnston will again play on the defence for the New Westminster team, which Hugh Lehman will manage. Kenny Malien will be on the forward line.

Kingston will have a Senior O. H. A. team, two Junior O. H. A. teams, two Senior Intercollegiate, one Intermediate College and four Junior College teams.

Frank Patrick's proposed offside rule for ice hockey will be tested at Victoria in two weeks, when the Vancouver and Victoria professional teams will play an exhibition game. Frank Patrick is away on the States on a business trip, but a dispatch from Victoria states that Lester Patrick has announced Friday, Nov. 28, as the date of the test match.

The rink at Strathroy has been pronounced unsafe, and that town may not be represented in the O. H. A. this year.

Bob Armstrong, counted on as a star for Woodstock College O. H. A. team, has been called home to Fort William and will not return.

Managers of the Manufacturers' Hockey League will hold their next meeting in Y. M. C. A. last evening.

A meeting of the Manufacturers' Hockey League was held last night in the Y. M. C. A., when several matters pertaining to the coming season were dealt with. Five clubs were represented at the meeting, and four of them announced the colors under which their teams will play this winter. They were as follows:

D. S. Perrins—Blue and white.

Green-Swifts—Green and white.

McCormicks—Brown and white.

Lawson & Jones—Purple and white.

The McCarty management has not yet decided what colors its team will have.

A Sixth Team Needed.

The league is still in need of a sixth team, but it is expected no trouble will be experienced in obtaining one. Secretary Gill is in communication with several firms who are considering placing a team in the league, and it is believed the new team will be represented at the next meeting.

The arrangements for a rink were left with President Lawson and Secretary Gill to deal with, while the protest, consisting of Messrs. Kompass, Rhodes and Perry, was appointed to deal with all disputes or protested games.

The new constitution of the league has been drawn up, and the secretary instructed to have copies of it made. The new clauses were gone over at last night's meeting and found to be satisfactory.

JACK JOHNSON WILL MEET FRANK MORAN

Bout for Heavyweight Title Will Be Fought in Paris in January.

Paris, Nov. 19.—Jack Johnson was matched today to fight Frank Moran in the second week in January at Paris for the heavyweight championship of the world. Two clubs, the Nouveau Cirque and Wonderland Francaise, are now bidding for the fight. The Nouveau Cirque, which would hold the bout at the dome of the Eiffel tower, has offered Johnson \$50 per cent of the gross gate receipts, and Moran \$25. The Wonderland club, which is under the control of Theodore Vienne, the biggest French fight promoter, submits its bid tomorrow.

Johnson is willing to fight Moran and defend his title on account of the recent action of the International Boxing Union declaring the heavyweight title vacant. Dan McKettrick, Moran's manager, said the reports that Johnson's finances require his re-entrance to the ring are both he and Johnson prefer Vienne's club, which is worth \$100,000, and have taken a \$100 per month apartment in Paris, after buying a new motor. McKettrick also says both he and John prefer Mr. Vienne's club to get the fight, which would then be held in Luna Park, Paris, where they can draw a big society house.

JOHNNY COULON  
PASSED THROUGH

Famous Bantamweight Champion Was in London Short Time Wednesday.

HE LIKED THE HUNTING  
Was Reported Lost While He Was in Parry Sound District—Shot a Big Buck.

Johnny Coulon, bantam weight champion of the world, passed through London on Wednesday morning on his way to Chicago. He did not stop off here any length of time, as his train was a through one and only hesitated here for about fifteen minutes. The famous little fighter had a change to take a squirt at the city, or as much of it as can be seen from the Grand Trunk station platform and Richmond street, and he was favorably impressed. He met a couple of Londoners on the train on the way down from Toronto, and during the conversation stated that he had paid a visit to this city some years ago, before he had entered the boxing game.

Was Reported Drowned.  
Coulon at one time lived in Toronto, or at least he claims that rather doubtful distinction. However, he learned the boxing game in the States, and has met with all his success in that country. Last week it was feared that he had been drowned during the big storm that swept the lakes, as he had gone up on one of the boats for a hunting trip. However, where he had some of the finest hunting in his life, according to what he told the local men. "I intend to sack here every fall," he stated. "There is some great hunting and fishing in my country, and I had a fine time on my trip. I shot one of the biggest bucks ever found in the Parry Sound district," and he proudly produced a photograph to prove the assertion. It was a small buck, and Coulon could talk little else but hunting after that.

Will Be Kept Busy.  
He intends to resume fighting again this winter, but it is not likely he will step into the ring before the first of the year. He says that he has been busy in January, and will be kept busy in February and March defending his title.

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HEAVY DAMAGE DONE  
IN NORTHERN FORESTS

Storm Wrecked Thousands of Dollars Worth of Splendid Timber.

Thessalon, Nov. 20.—Woodsmen and hunters now coming out of the timber country in and adjacent to the Missis- sauga forest reserve report that a vast amount of damage had been caused by the recent great storm to the standing timber. While there is a difference of opinion as to the extent of the damage done all who have been in the back townships admit that it is tremendous. One man estimates the amount of fallen timber at no less than 40 per cent.

Not only will the loss from fallen timber be great, but it greatly in- creases the danger from fire during the next season, and for summers to come unless steps are taken to prevent it. Lumbermen in the limits bordering on the reserve will have much extra work in clearing roads, which have been badly obstructed. One lumberman reports that 70 per cent of his particular limit is now down. The Ontario Government will do well to take immediate steps to investigate the extent of the damage and decide what should be done to eliminate as far as possible the fire risk.
