

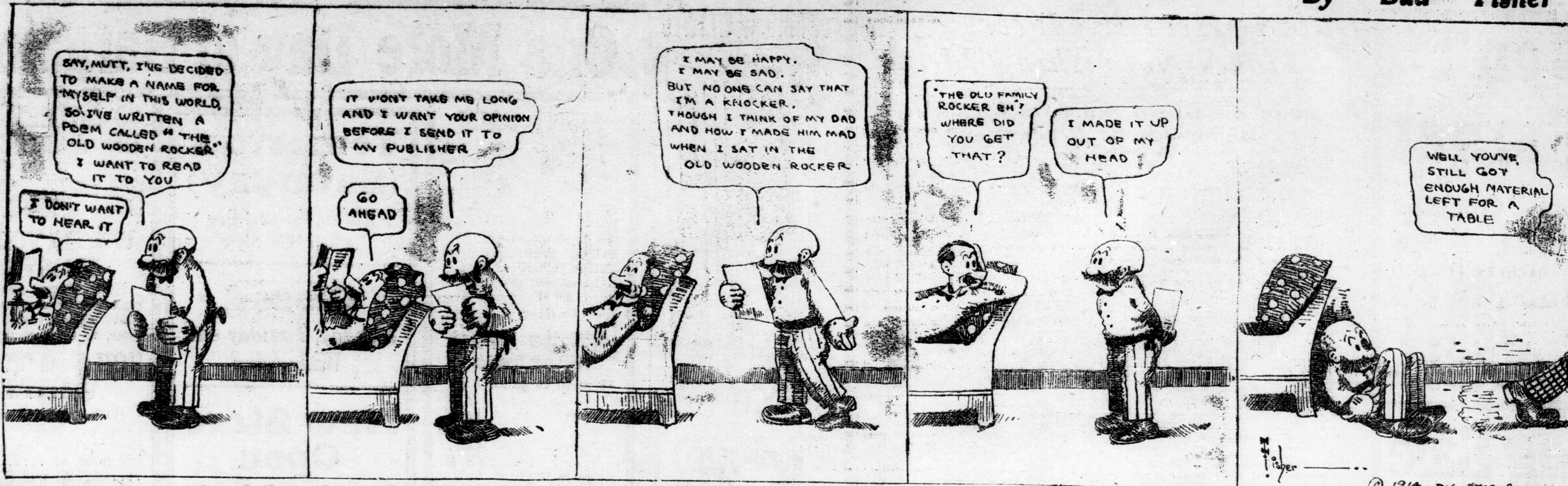

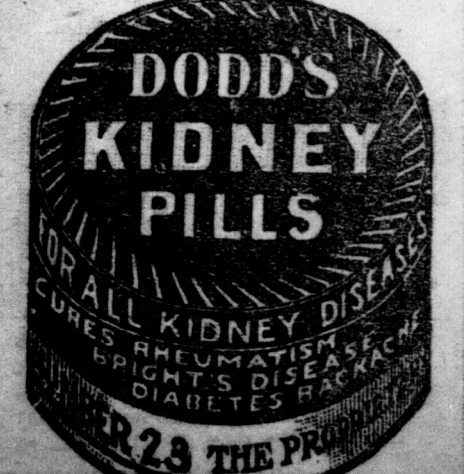

TO RESTRICT THE USE
OF THE FORWARD PASS

[Canadian Press.] New York, Feb. 5.—Changes in the rules to restrict the forward pass, which last season was used so successfully by the smaller college teams, many times spelling defeat for larger rivals, will be proposed at today's meeting of the intercollegiate football rules committee. It is proposed to make it obligatory on the part of the thrower to toss the ball without delay after receiving it back of the line. As the rule now stands the thrower may delay delivery of the ball as long as he likes and may run to any part of the field before making the throw.

TENNIS PLAYERS NOT
ALLOWED EXPENSES

New York, Feb. 5.—A proposed rule, prohibiting American amateur tennis players from accepting expense money, except in world, national, sectional and state tournaments, has been approved by the United States National Lawn Tennis Association, and will be offered as an amendment to the bylaws at the meeting of the association to be held on the 13th of February.

The international federation rule in force abroad permits the payment of expenses only in world championships.

BOTH MAJOR LEAGUES
TO HAVE SAME RULES

New York, Feb. 5.—John B. Foster, secretary of the New York National League club, today sent out a call for a meeting of the National League rules committee, to be held in this city at 10 o'clock on the morning of Feb. 9. The meeting will be held at the offices of the New York club. The rules committee consists of Mr. Foster, Manager Miller Huggins, of the St. Louis club, and Umpire Henry O'Day.

Later next week the National League rules committee will hold a joint meeting with the American League committee, which is made up of President Ban Johnson, Charles W. Somers, of Cleveland, and Connie Mack, of the Philadelphia Athletics. The committee will arrive to have all rules interpreted the same way in both leagues. At present, there is a difference of opinion on the infield fly rule. A new rule, defining a balk more specifically, may be passed, while a rule will be passed covering a case where an umpire is hit by a thrown ball.

SWIMMING RECORD GONE. Chicago, Feb. 5.—Harry Heboy established a world's record for 150 yards indoor swim in the second series of the Central A.A.U. championships last night. He swam the distance in 1:31.75 and equalled the world's mark of 1:33.25 for 100 yards. Perry McGilvray broke two American records. He made 250 yards in 2:53.35, clipping two seconds off the mark, and finished the 500 yards in 3:29.15. The former record for this distance was 3:35.45. All of the old records for the above events were held by C. M. Daniels.
