#### TENNIS PLAYERS NOT ALLOWED EXPENSES

New York, Feb. 5. — A proposed rule, prohibiting American amateur tennis players from accepting expense money, except in world, national, sectional and state tournaments, has been approved by the amateur rules committee of the United States National Lawn Tennis Association, and will be offered as an amendment to the bylaws at the meeting of the association to be held on the 13th of February.

The international federation rule in force abroad permits the payment of expenses only in world's championships.
