TRADES CONGRESS WILL
SANCTION CONSCRIPTION

If Necessary in Event of Voluntary
System Proving Inadequate.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—The Trades
Union Congress has issued a manifesto
expressing approval of the efforts which
the Labor members in the House of
Commons are making in conjunction
with the representatives of other parties
to stimulate recruiting.
The manifesto states that in the
event of the voluntary system of mili-
tary service proving inadequate at the
present time, the need would result
in greatly strengthening the advocacy
of compulsory service. Accordingly the
manhood of the nation should rally to
the defence of the country in such a
manner.

THE LOCAL MARKET

There was a large falling off in the
price of oats, new and old, yesterday
afternoon, the prices remaining the
same today. Old oats dropped from 10
to 15 cents a cwt., while new oats
dropped 12 to 16 cents. This falling
off in price is probably due to the large
supply offered late yesterday afternoon
and to the fact that the majority of
the farmers are through threshing and
now have time to attend to their crops.
Hay remained firm. There were
about fifteen loads for sale. There was
a good demand.
There was also a falling off in the
price of potatoes yesterday afternoon
of 5 to 10 cents per bushel. They are
now selling at 80 cents to 90 cents a
bushel.
Pickling pears are in good demand,
and bring 50 to 60 cents a bushel. The
larger varieties are selling at 90 cents
to \$1 a bushel.
Butcher's meats still continue to re-
main firm with a fairly good supply
and a fair demand.

Winnipeg, Sept. 3.—Wheat prices
were stronger in grain today
opening. October and December opened
1/4c higher, and advanced steadily,
with a fair buying demand. Exporters
were said to be buyers of futures in
fair volume.

Receipts continue to increase. 357 cars
unloaded Wednesday, and 229 cars
in eight today. Despite this fact, offer-
ings in the cash department are light,
farmers holding out in anticipation of
further advances.

May opened late in the day at 2 1/2c
advance.
Cash wheat demand was quiet, except
for small parcels of spot. Oats were
steady, and flax about steady.

Inspection lists for the year ending
August 31 have been issued, showing
increases on all grains except flax. The
weather may show a decided improve-
ment in all wheat provinces. Frost was
recorded at a few points, however.

May continued to advance after a
late opening, and went a fraction over
12 1/2c.
Wheat closed 3/4c to 3/8c higher.

higher; barley, 1c to 2c higher.

Chicago, Sept. 4.—Wheat today con-
tinued to break high price records of
the present winter. It was said that
export demand was active and was bas-
ed on large orders for the Governments
of Great Britain, France and Greece.

Besides, there were rumors that Hol-
land had received an ultimatum from
Germany. The opening, which was 1/4c
to 1 1/2c higher, was followed by an ad-
ditional ascent, averaging more than 2c
all around, compared with last night.

CANADA'S DUTY TO
SEIZE NEW TRADE

Minister of Commerce Says
Manufacturers Should Get
German Business, Not
Close Down.

TORONTO, Sept. 3.—Hon. George E.
Foster, minister of trade and commerce,
who was today the chief guest at the
Toronto Exhibition luncheon, delivered
a forcible speech in which he stated
that instead of closing down factories
and laying off men, the manufacturers
and industrialists of Toronto should
seize the opportunity to extend their
markets which the war afforded.
