

CAN'T CALL MY OFFICE FOLLOWING A CAREER

Declares Mrs. June Carter, Supreme Worthy High Priestess, White Shrine of Jerusalem.

ON LEAVE FROM HOME

Distinguished Visitor Inspecting Palestine White Shrine Claims Kinship With Canadians.

A little above average height, slender, graceful, with an abundance of dark hair, and dark eyes, Mrs. June Carter, of Denver, Colorado, supreme worthy high priestess for Canada and the United States of the White Shrine of Jerusalem, presented a striking and most attractive picture last evening on the occasion of her official visit to Palestine White Shrine in the headquarters, Alma Block.

Emotionally becoming was her gown of fuchsia satin, draped with lace in the same tone, a fluffy feather boa, shading from pale mauve to purple-fuchsia resting on her shoulders, and diamond ornaments answering the sparkle of her eyes.

A long, long way from home she has traveled to come to London, and a roundabout road from Denver to Nebraska, Illinois, Ohio, Iowa, Pennsylvania, New York, then back to Ontario, visiting since last May 140 White Shrines which are under her jurisdiction.

And also she has been in Oklahoma. She has particularly happy recollections of her stay there, because it was in the state capital that her husband joined her to celebrate Christmas, owing to the fact an official with such responsibilities as she is carrying was unable to return home for the holiday.

"Do you believe a woman, with husband, family and home, can manage a career as Mrs. Carter?" The Advertiser asked Mrs. Carter.

"You couldn't exactly call my office a career, since I only hold it for a year," smilingly answered Mrs. Carter. "I haven't any children, or it would not be possible for me to take this year off from home responsibilities as I am doing. You see, my husband is giving me a year's leave of absence, or rather seven months, to be absolutely accurate, on order to thoroughly inspect the work from coast to coast in the United States and Canada. It will take me just about seven months to do it. Naturally I want to serve faithfully while I am in office, and my husband is anxious that I shall do my duty to the organization."

Mrs. Carter spoke with enthusiasm of the order in which she has held since last May so exalted a position. "The White Shrine is a secret organization in which I have taken a very active part," she said. "It is essentially a religious and benevolent organization, based upon the teachings with regard to the nativity of Christ, and our mission is to herald the glad tidings of the coming of the king. We are a secret organization, but I say our ritual is as beautiful, as solemn and impressive as that of any other order. Yet we are strictly non-sectarian and non-political."

Because of the order of which she is supreme head, Mrs. Carter refused to discuss politics, even to give any opinion on feminism. "Of course," she said, "women have the vote in the States, and that is as it should be."

Apart from the work of the White Shrine, the cause of prohibition has had the warm sympathy of Mrs. Carter, though she never identified herself with the W.C.T.U. or other temperance organization.

How does she think it is working out in the United States?

"In Colorado," she said, "it is evidently proving a blessing to the people in poorer circumstances. The testimony of grocers and other merchants from the early days of prohibition was that bills were paid more promptly and that there was money for the necessities of life. I have heard this comment in a number of states which I have visited, but since my mission has been White Shrine business, I couldn't be quoted or make any statement for publication with regard to how prohibition is working out in the States."

Mrs. Carter referred to the strength of her organization in the middle west, where she makes her home, and also chatted of people she had met in her travels.
