Ottawa, Dec. 17.—The interim inrestigation and report conducted and submitted by Customs Officers Duncan and Wilson, upon which was based the order-in-council calling for the dismissal of J. E. Bessaillon, chief preventive officer of the ports of Montreal, are being supplemented by a further and more extensive investigation, pending the completion of this inquiry, full details regarding the Besaillon dismissal are being withheld for obvious




