

SLANDER CASE DEFENDANTS ARE REPRIMANDED BY JUDGE

\$10,000 Action Closes When
Perkhill People Withdraw
Imputations.

COURT COSTS PAID

Imputations affecting the character of Mrs. John Gilbert, Parkhill, were withdrawn by George Coates and James Metcalfe, neighbors of the plaintiff, by J. M. McEvoy, K.C., during the course of two \$10,000 actions for slander and libel, brought by Mrs. Gilbert against the two men, at the courthouse yesterday, and the case was settled on payment of costs by the defendants. N. F. Newton, Parkhill, acted for Mrs. Gilbert.

Mr. Justice Lennox spoke of the actions of the defendants in a most scathing manner. "Gentlemen of the jury," he said, "You have been relieved of the embarrassment of having to decide this unpleasant matter between neighbors. There was an element to my mind more serious than slander. I think it unfortunate that these men and the women they collected should be camped about this woman's home, which they had no business to do."

"For that there was no justification. If they had trespassed on that property and I was assessing, I would make it high. The conditions revealed in this case are deplorable and shows lack of proper feeling. I never heard of anything like this before. I have heard of people prying on other people's property, but for respectable people to do this was worse than slander."

Shields Actress, Prince Is Fined

Associated Press Despatch.

Paris, Nov. 4.—Prince Boris
Golitzne, former vice-president of
the Russian drama, and cousin of
the late Emperor Nicholas, but
more recently employed as head
chef in the Jugo-Slavian restau-
rant at the exposition of decora-
tive arts, ran afoul of the George
law and has been fined 25 francs
and costs. He acted as protecting
knight to an actress who was tak-
ing up a collection in the restau-
rant, over whose kitchen the for-
mer drama official is now presid-
ing.

plaintiff, was the first witness called
by Mr. Newton. He stated that he
was employed on the C. N. R. as a
painter and only got home week-ends.
The defendant Coates lived next door.
On Sunday, August 3, last, he heard
stories about his wife and George
Law, who ran a parcel express in
Parkhill. He was told that eight
people on his street could prove the
story that Coates could not be
witnessed on to relate now he
had gone to Coates and told him
that he (Coates) was the main starter
of the yarn. Coates said that he
didn't like to tell him, as he didn't
want to break up his home. After
a little persuasion, Coates told wit-
ness he saw Elliott in the Gilbert
backyard and didn't know how he
got there. Elliott went in the back
door of the cottage and Coates went
into his own house and told his wife,
"There is a bird caged at Gilbert's."
Witness said Coates told him Mr.
Metcalfe then came over and he, too,
watched the "bird caged." Coates
watched for half an hour, and then
went to work in the garden and didn't
see Elliott leave.

In the meantime the news travelled
fast, and soon Mrs. Metcalfe, Mrs.
Coates and Mrs. Pearson were on the
job with a Mr. Nichols, who was
told that a bird was caged.

Crowd Gathers.

"Then in a short time the Metho-
dist minister came along, so Mr.
Coates told me," related Mr. Gilbert.
"The women talked to him and told
him, too, that a bird had been caged."
Mr. Metcalfe went round to the
front of the house (he had been
watching at the back) and told the
women, "Now that you have made
the minister curious, you better tell
him the rest of it and what's going
on."

Mr. Metcalfe, the next witness,
told counsel: "He certainly would
watch to see what was going on."
This led the court to ask witness
if he always watched every time he
saw some person enter another per-
son's house.

Witness said he watched the Gil-
bert house for two and one-half
hours and didn't see anyone come
out. He had arrived at 12:45 p.m.,
just after his dinner.

George Coates denied saying, "We
have a bird caged," when questioned
by Mr. McEvoy, but he did say,
"Elliott is in there with Mrs. Gilbert
and we see how long he stays
there." He denied talking to the
minister and others.

Witness claimed that his state-
ments were true in fact and sub-
stance, but denied any innuendo. He
recounted his conversation with Mr.
Gilbert.

Coates Questioned.

Questioned by Mr. Newton, Coates

said he told Gilbert about it be-
cause he thought it was his duty.
Q.—You were talking juicy bits of
scandal, you old fellows, weren't
you? No answer.

Q.—You knew you had a congrega-
tion of the worst gossips in Park-
hill that day, didn't you? No
answer.

Q.—You allowed this woman's name
to be dragged in the mud when you
could have saved it. Why did you
do it? No answer.

Q.—You started this story and
made Mrs. Gilbert the talk of the
town. You were hoping Gilbert
would sue his wife for divorce and
that you would get a trip to Ottawa,
weren't you? A.—No.

Q.—Nothing goes on along the
street that the same gang doesn't
know about. You make a business
of knowing other people's affairs,
don't you, Mr. Coates? A.—I wouldn't
say that.

Q.—Ten people watched the house
and one of them saw Elliott come
out? A.—He was seen a few feet
from it.

Q.—Do you know Gilbert and El-
liott are still friends? A.—Yes.
It was at this point in the case
that the judge called a recess and
talked to both counsel in his cham-
bers, after which Mr. McEvoy an-
nounced that his clients withdrew
all imputations against the plaintiff.

Mrs. Gilbert, dark and pretty, was
in the courtroom for only part of
the case. Neither she nor Mr. Elliott
were called as witnesses.

This concluded the jury list of six
cases. His lordship will commence
the non-jury cases this morning at
10 o'clock.

ILDERTON FRUIT MEN STILL PICKING APPLES
