There is now plenty of water to supply all ordinary demands, and even should the present dry weather continue, the Commission is not apprehensive, believing that with the assistance of the consumers, there will be little danger of a shortage. In the meantime, however, water is not to be used for lawns or gardens.

Work on the power line to the Glasgow street wells is progressing rapidly, and once this line is completed and the pumps in operation, the old order of things will be resumed.

## Berlin Hit By Cyclone

The thunderstorms which visited Berlin this afternoon were accompanied by a miniature cyclone, which, while not of a disastrous nature, caused no little damage to property.

The big wind struck the town at 2:25 and although it continued for but a few minutes it had the effect of severely frightening timid spectators.

To a large extent, several being. The awnings on King Street suffered from their fastenings, and others badly ripped, and in some cases completely torn in two. The plate glass door in Knell's hardware was smashed, and overhead signs were bent and twisted.

So suddenly did the wind approach that umbrellas were torn from the hands of pedestrians and blown far along the streets. Branches were torn from trees, windows in houses broken, and other damage caused.

It has been impossible to secure any reports from the country but it is hardly possible that the crops will have escaped serious damage.

It is estimated that for a few minutes the wind blew at a rate of 75 miles an hour. In one case the heavy seat of a delivery wagon was picked up and hurled over the horses head. Loose boards were picked up and blown about, and for a few seconds it appeared to be filled with flying missiles. A pedestrian on King Street narrowly escaped being hit by a falling plan.

## FAMILY FIGHT OVER 50 CENTS

Brother Against Brother Results in a Police Court Case.

A packing case, valued at 50 cents, was the cause of a dispute between two brothers, which resulted in a case in Police Court this morning. It appears that originally the father owned three packing cases, of which each of two sons had secured one. One of the sons claimed that his brother had stolen one of the cases. The defendant claimed that the case was his property and had been loaned him by his father.

The quarrel over the fifty cent box led to some harsh words between the parties concerned, and the brother charged with left laid a charge of using abusive language against his brother and his mother.
