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LOCAL SCIENTIST TALKS OF EARTHQUAKE

Cooling of Planet and Other Causes Acting Conjointly Responsible for Quake.

(From Friday's Daily.) Mr. F. Napier Denison, of the meteor-ological department, at the request of a Coionist reporter, yesterday made an m teresting statement outlining the cause of earthquakes. The well known local scientist is fitted by considerable study to furnish adequate information concerning such upheavals as that which has just occurred at San Francisco. He spent a year on the lsle of Wight studying with Prof. Milne, the noted seisming expert, who invented the wonderful seismograph, one of which instruments recorded the recent earthquake in this city, and Mr. Denison also made a prolonged visit to Vesuvius and examined that crater and those of neighboring volcanoes, having many opportunities to study his chosen subject with the note! 
