THE BYRNE CASE AT CHATHAM

The Byrne case which was considered in the Police Court on Friday morning was postponed till this Friday. At it, Mr. Guthrie, the prosecutor for the crown, declared the bail forfeited as the defendant did not appear, and it will rest in the hands of the local authorities to have it collected in case the defendant does not appear. Mr. Guthrie told The Gazette that there was no truth in the rumor that the bail was rendered worthless by that it had been illegally received. A warrant was said to have been issued for the arrest of Dr. Byrne who, it would seem, has undoubtedly left town for parts unknown and steps will be taken to find out his whereabouts and have him arrested. Mr. Guthrie left for Fredericton Saturday morning and will return for the examinations this coming Friday.

TRIBUTE TO DEAD RULER

General Nogi and His Wife Committed Suicide According to Japanese Custom.

Tokio, Sept. 13.—General Count Maresuke Nogi, Supreme Military Councillor of the Empire, and his wife, the Countess Nogi, committed suicide to-night, in accordance with the ancient Japanese custom, as their final tribute to their departed Emperor and friend, Mutsuhito.

The taking off by their own hands of the famous General Nogi and his wife was dramatic as it was sad. The General cut his throat with a short sword and the Countess committed hari-kari.

Following the Samurai custom, the couple had carefully prepared their plans for killing themselves and timed them so that they would be coincident with the departure forever from Tokio of the dead Emperor.

General Nogi and the Countess had attended the funeral services of Mutsuhito at the palace, and it was expected that they would proceed to Aoyama with the cortege. Instead, at the conclusion of the ceremony they withdrew to their modest home in Akasaka, a suburb of Tokio, and there began the final preparations for death.

First the General wrote a letter to his new Emperor Yoshihito. They he draped in mourning a portrait of the late Emperor, and afterwards he and his wife dressed themselves in full Japanese costume and drank a farewell cup of sake from cups which had been presented to the General by Mutsuhito.

Darkness had fallen and General Nogi and the Countess sat and awaited the signal they had agreed upon to announce their leave-taking.

This was the booming of a single gun in the palace grounds at Tokio, which was to let the people know that the body of the Emperor was starting for its last resting place.

As the boom of the signal gun resounded, General Nogi arose and grasping tightly in his hand a short sword, plunged it into his throat, while the Countess stabbed herself in the stomach. A student who resided in the Nogi home heard the fall of the bodies and rushed into the room. Lying upon the floor were the hero of Port Arthur and his wife. Both still were breathing, but their spasmodic gasps showed plainly that their lives were fast ebbing. The student went for aid, but when he returned both the General and the Countess had passed away.

The tragedy created a profound sensation and expressions of sorrow were heard on every hand. Especially grief-stricken was Prince Arthur of Connaught, who was to have gone with General Nogi to the former capital of the Shogunate, Kamakura.

Those who knew General Nogi well declared that his calmness in killing himself was the kind of gallantry he always had displayed, no matter what crisis faced him.

WAR ADVANTAGE OF AEROPLANES

London, Sept. 15.—The war office issued last week a long memorandum on the employment of air craft in war. It points out that it cannot longer be doubted that airships and aeroplanes are of the greatest advantage in locating the enemy and obtaining information which otherwise could only be obtained by force that all the powers are expending money and energy in the development of an air service which is certain to have an important bearing on future European wars, and deals with the details of the instructions for the use of air craft in the coming manoeuvres. The memorandum emphasizes the fact that the employment of these machines is quite experimental and that the present war in Tripoli, although it has given an impetus to aviation, has afforded no tests because the Italians had the air themselves.

WINDOW SMASHERS NOT WANTED HERE

English Militant Suffragettes Will be Barred as Undesirables.

Ottawa, September 13.—When the English militant suffragettes come to Canada to incite aggressive method, here, they may find the door barred against them. An order of the immigration Branch to that effect is now under advisement. No formal action would be taken until the ladies set sail, when an order will probably issue barring their entrance to the country as "Undesirables" within the meaning of the Act.

The suffragettes are coming deliberately to cause trouble, and this reason, together with the fact that a number of them have served time on criminal charges, is responsible for the proposed action of the department.

It is understood that many Canadian suffragettes object to the interference of the British militants and approve of their being debarred.

Should they come by a Canadian route, they may be stopped at Quebec and if by way of New York, the prohibition would be enforced at the border.

WHOOPIING COUGH KILLS SIXTEEN

Toronto, Sept. 16.—The infant mortality in Toronto is giving Dr. Hastings, City Medical Health Officer, considerable concern. He reported to the local board of health yesterday that last month there were 209 deaths, or 45 per cent of children under two years of age, and 178 infants, or 38 per cent, under one year. Of twenty-five deaths of children under two years old, from acute contagious diseases, nine were from diphtheria in the St. Vincent's Infants home. Sixteen of the remaining cases were from whooping cough.
