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## MATAPEDIA VALLEY ROUTE NOW MAPPED OUT IN DETAIL FROM RIV. DU LOUP TO CAMPBELLTON

**This Work Completed On Monday and Will Be Incorporated In Road Map To Be Issued Shortly—Road In Fair Condition And Being Improved—Scenic Route Likely To Become A Popular Northern Entrance For Tourists To N. B.**

That the far-famed Matapedia Valley route will from now on rapidly gain popularity as the natural northern entrance to New Brunswick for tourists from United States and the West, as a result of this road having been mapped out in detail from Campbellton to Riviere du Loup, Que., is the opinion of Restigouche officials of the N. B. Tourist and Resources Association as well as others who are directly interested in tourist traffic to this part of the province.

### Just Completed

This work which was completed on Monday, was done by Messrs. G. A. Moraw, in the interests of the N. B. Automobile Association and S. P. MacKenzie, representing the Graphic Limited, which firm will shortly issue a Tourist Road Map and Guide of Northern New Brunswick. In this booklet will be found the Matapedia Valley Road. These Road Maps will be circulated extensively throughout Upper Quebec, Ontario and the Eastern States, as well as being supplied all summer visitors motoring through this territory. It is felt by those who have an intimate knowledge of the tourist trade that this map and guide will eventually mean much in developing the tourist business to proportions commensurate with the varied attractions of Northern New Brunswick.

### Encouraging Report

Messrs. Moraw and MacKenzie brought back a very encouraging report after completing their inspection tour over this road. It appears that a stretch of bad road between Riviere du Loup and a few rough spots along other parts of the route have been corrected to give this road a bad name which, in spite of its rare scenic beauty, it has failed to out-live. During the past few summer seasons however, much road work of a very satisfactory nature has been done and now nearly three-quarters of the road is in very good shape. A large part of this indeed is in excellent condition and the motorist may make good time on his tour through a very beautiful country.

### More Work To Be Done

The remainder of the road is according to business men along the route, to be turpined and gravelled this summer. When this is done this road is certain to become one of New Brunswick's most important inlets for tourist traffic.

### A Wonderful Trip

The motorist who comes to New Brunswick via the Matapedia Valley route may feel sure of a truly wonderful trip. With the exception of a few miles where the road takes the traveller through a rather uninteresting country, this route is one of unexcelled scenic charms. On his way the motorist follows the shore of the mighty St. Lawrence for upwards of fifty miles and later the north bank of the beautiful Matapedia River for some thirty-five miles until its junction with the Restigouche at Matapedia.

The ever-changing series of remarkable views along his route are scenes of rare pictorial grandeur. Even those who have beheld the varied charms of foreign lands declare that the scenic beauty of this territory surpasses that of many of the world's most famous beauty-spots. For miles on miles, over a smooth level road where the motorist may determine his own rate of speed, the route follows the swift Matapedia River with lofty green forested mountains rising abruptly above him on either side. In summer the road is a cathedral of fresh green verdure beneath the canopy of tree branches. In the autumn this emerald beauty is transformed to a world of gold, touched with splashes of crimson while a purple haze crowns the hilltops where the summits seem to touch the blue infinity of heaven. No artist could creditably reproduce the valley district itself there.

Along the route the motorist enjoys lake and streams, the sweeping panoramas of the St. Lawrence Valley, the mountain views and the rare littoral views along the shore of the St. Lawrence River all have a charm for the motorist.

Large numbers of motorists from the United States and Canada are now on their way to New Brunswick and now with the guidance from the south.

The deceased who was in his 76th year, was brought to the Hospital here suffering from cancer. No hope was entertained for his recovery on account of the serious nature of his case. The remains were forwarded to his late home at Port Daniel on Tuesday morning and from there the funeral services were held yesterday afternoon.

Deceased leaves to mourn the loss of a kind devoted husband and father, his devoted wife, three sons, George at home, Cecil in Vermont and Fred in Edmundston; and five daughters, Mrs. F. Ferguson, of Port Daniel, Mrs. Frank LeGallais, Sayabec, Mrs. Walter Jardine of Moncton, Mrs. Chas. Wilson, and Mrs. John Dow in the West. To those the heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended in the loss they have been called upon to bear.

Ottawa, June 18.—Baron Byng of Vimy is not remaining for second term as Governor General of Canada, Premier King told the House of Commons yesterday in answer to a question asked by Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the Opposition. His Excellency had expressed his regrets that only exceptional public need would compel him to remain longer than the regular term.
