RESTIGOUCHE FOR APPOINTMENT

Vacancy in Senate Should Be Filled By Restigouche Resident.

A meeting of a number of prominent business men was held in W. H. Milne's office Saturday afternoon when the matter of the vacancy in the Senate caused by the death of Senator Thompson was discussed. It was the unanimous opinion of these men that we should keep no time in asserting our rights and claim the appointment for a citizen of the county of Restigouche. The name of Hon. Wm. Currie was put forth and unanimously received.

It was decided that a meeting would be held Monday evening when the matter would be more fully gone into. Monday evening a meeting was held in Mr. M. A. Kelly's office, when the whole matter was discussed and a strong resolution passed asking the government to appoint Hon. Mr. Currie to the vacant seat in the senate.

This resolution was sent to Hon. Mr. King, Hon. Mr. Cope, Pius Michaud, M. P. and Hon. Chas. Maréchal. It is fitting that the appointment should go to Hon. Wm. Currie. He is a native of this county, who through integrity and hard work has risen from the ranks to an honorable position in the province. He was for some time chairman of the Restigouche Pilgrimage commission, served two years in the municipal and one year in the town council. In politics he has always been a staunch Liberal. For three terms he represented Restigouche in the local legislature, and for one term was speaker of that body. He is a humorist of repute. The question may be asked has Restigouche any special claim upon this appointment at this particular time.

In answer it is pointed out that while every other county in the province either has or has had at some time the honor of representation in the red chamber, Restigouche has never had that honor. Why is this? It is because we are dead to our interests. If this is the case, then we must awake and assert our rights.

SPECIAL MEETINGS OF TOWN COUNCIL

Purchase of Large Lot Up for Further Consideration—On Until Saturday.

A special meeting of the town council was held last evening to hear the report of a committee appointed at a previous special meeting to obtain information regarding the purchase of a large lot owned by J. B. Legere from the Alexander estate.

Deputy Mayor St. Onge called the meeting to order and explained why the meeting had been called. There were present: Council, Belle-Lale, Gilker, Graham, Duncan, Moore and Marquis.

Coun. Gilker, chairman of the special committee appointed to obtain the information required reported that the committee had interviewed Mr. F. F. Matheson and that gentleman had informed them that the power had been laid down when he was in the town council about twenty-one years ago, and had been put down without written permission. The town may have some rights now through the property, but he doubted if they could go on this private lot to repair same. The report was received and adopted.

There was some discussion upon legal points and it was thought better to delay action until the town solicitor returned. The council then adjourned.

FIRE FOLLOWS-A

Moncton, May 2.—Mans' pasteurized milk factory, situated in Lewisville, was burned to the ground between 10 and 11 o'clock tonight. The loss is placed at \$8,000, with insurance about \$4,000.

It is not known how the fire originated. The fire broke out during an electrical storm, and it is possible that the lightning, however, did not appear to be close enough to strike, but there were several sharp flashes.

TWO INJURED IN A COSTLY MADAWASKA CO.

St. Leonard, May 3.—The St. Leonard Madawaska Co. has destroyed the residence of J. Oyr and the barn of C. Ayotte and Vital Theriault. Mr. Theriault lost two dozen sheep and several head of cattle. His loss is \$8,000. Mr. Oyr's loss is \$4,000, and Mr. Ayotte's loss is about \$6,000. He and his wife were severely burned in attempting to save four valuable horses, which perished. The fire was caused by children playing with matches in one of the barns.

HOSPITAL DAY FRIDAY, MAY 12

Interesting Program Planned For Whole Day at Soldiers' Memorial Hospital.

The Soldiers' Memorial Hospital management intend to take part in the celebration of "Hospital Day" on the twelfth instant.

Committees are now at work preparing a programme which is not yet complete. It has been decided that the hospital will not be open for visitation of the public on that day. It is deemed inadvisable because the admission of the public might prove injurious to patients and besides we have in sight to indiscriminately involve the privacy of patients who have committed themselves to our care.

The nurses will, however, have booths on the grounds of the hospital where different phases of hospital work will be illustrated. The Ladies Aid will sell refreshments and other articles. There will also be a tag sale on the grounds and generally throughout the town. The ladies who will be authorized to sell tags in aid of the hospital will wear white bands on their left arm with the words "Soldiers' Memorial Hospital" printed thereon.

TOWN'S FINANCIAL STANDING GOOD

Bonds Offered for Sale Bring Nearly Par on Toronto Market.

The tenders for Campbellton's \$90,000 water sewerage, and over-drift bonds, accepted and the tender of the City of Toronto, accepted. This clearly demonstrates that Campbellton's standing is high among the financial institutions of the Dominion.

Toronto, May 3.—Gairdner, Clark and Company, investment bankers, have secured by private negotiations a \$90,000 bond issue of the town of Campbellton. The bonds bear interest at five and half per cent and are due in 35 years. The purchase price was \$99.82.

BUTTER PRICES DECLINE.

Montreal Gazette: At the Quebec Agricultural Co-operative Society sale held at the Board of Trade on Monday there were 495 packages creamery butter offered, of which ninety-five packages of pasteurized creamery sold at 32 3/4c. per lb.; 360 packages finest creamery at 32c. and forty packages fine creamery at 30 1/2c. which prices show a decline of 3c. to 3 3/8c. per lb. as compared with last Friday's figures.

SAWMILL AND LUMBER BURNED OUT.

Three million feet of lumber, a sawmill, two houses, a quantity of lathes and railway ties were destroyed by fire at Lake Frontenac, Montmagny County, Tuesday evening, according to Chief Forester G. C. Piche. The mill hands and the forest rangers of the district fought the fire under Inspector F. M. Roche, of Lands and Forests Department, who reported the fire to be under control last night. The Hon. Honore Mercier, Minister of Lands and Forests, in commenting on the fire urged greater care as the woods are dry at this time of the year, and the danger of fire is very great.
