CHRISTMAS TRADE
VERY GRATIFYING

*Merchants tell of Records of former
Years Smashed--All Say Business
Was Exceptionally Good*

The busyness of the Christmas season just ended has proved to be one of the best ever experienced in Campbellton. While, as a general rule it started late, yet at the close it made up for this so that at closing time Saturday night many stores had broken all previous records, with others had surpassed the year 1920.

The exceeding cold days of the week hampered trade, but Thursday, Friday and Saturday were very busy. Fortunately the storm which raged in the southern part of the province Friday night and Saturday morning, blocking the roads and making travel impossible, did not reach the north shore, so that a very heavy trade was done Saturday. The day was fine and just cold enough to make it bracing. From early morning until eleven o'clock the stores were crowded and did a rushing business.

All last week the big lumber companies were busy paying out money to their employees and jobbers, and by Saturday night one of the largest firms had paid out forty thousand dollars. This was like old times, and the merchants all felt the benefit of this cash. Other smaller companies and industries swelled this amount, so that there seemed to be plenty of cash for all.

Altogether Campbellton merchants enjoyed a very successful Christmas season.

Quebec Liquor Commissioners Annual Report.

Quebec, Dec. 20.—The annual report of the Quebec liquor commission for the fiscal year ending April 30, 1922, was tabled in the legislative assembly here today. The report shows a provincial treasure.

It is shown in the report that the sales of the year amounted to \$16,129,801.31, of which the net revenue was \$4,009,474.50. The total amount of the receipts from seizures, confiscations and fines is given as follows: Merchandise confiscated, \$73,382.15; fines imposed, \$125,590; fines received by the commission, \$54,830; merchandise which will probably be confiscated, \$355,734.67. The total number of seizures were 582, while the number of automobiles and trucks confiscated was fifteen.
