WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—By statute of the United States it is provided that when a patent is taken out in a foreign country and one subsequently is also secured in this country the patent shall expire in the United States with the expiration of the patent in the foreign country in which it first runs out. Under the Canadian law patents are granted for five years with the privilege of renewal for two periods of five years each. The question in a case decided by the United States Supreme Court to-day was whether the lifetime of an American patent expired 5 years from its issuance in Canada or at the end of fifteen years, which is the limit to which the life of a patent may be extended in Canada. The court held that the patent in the United States does not expire for fifteen years from the granting of the patent, that is to say, the lifetime of an American patent first taken out in a foreign country does not expire until the extreme limit of time for which an extension of patent may be secured in the foreign country.
